Approve Resolution #25-51 authorizing a lease with Central Environmental, Inc. for an approximately .85-acre portion of USS 439 (Pipeyard) owned by the City of Valdez.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

Community Development Department staff received a lease application from Central Environmental, Inc. for use of a 2-acre portion of USS 439 (Pipeyard) owned by the City of Valdez. Central Environmental received a temporary land use permit for this use starting July 7th for 6 months.

Central Environmental, Inc. requested use of the property for temporary staging of scrap metal awaiting shipment from the Port of Valdez (see attached lease application and narrative). The 2025 planned scrap metal barge was delayed, and they now need to stage material for longer than six months. The new term requested is two years, beginning at the expiration of their temporary land use permit in January 2026.

Fair rental value for leases is defined as 10% of appraised value annually pursuant to VMC 4.08.010. If this lease is approved, an appraisal will be ordered at the cost of the lessee. Additionally, the City of Valdez 2005 Property Management Policies and Procedures document requires a phase I environmental assessment be completed for all new leases of light industrial zoned land at the cost of the lessee. Central Environmental, Inc. completed a soil testing report prior to the staging of scrap metal which will be accepted as an alternative to a phase I environmental assessment. The property is zoned light industrial which allows for freight staging operations.

On October 22, 2025, the Planning and Zoning Commission voted to approve a recommendation to City Council to approve this lease.

Pending Council approval of this lease, staff will work with the City Attorney and Central

Central Environmental Inc. (CEI) is requesting the use of the property mentioned in the attached application to temporarily store sheet metal for later loading out onto a barge at the adjacent barge dock for recycling. The metal will be from Tank 92 at Alyeska marine terminal. Tank 92 has been retired and cleaned for many years at this point and no metal that is suspected of having remaining hydrocarbons on it will be staged at the laydown yard.


CEI has had an independent Environmental firm perform POL screening and sampling prior to the short term issuance of a TLUP. This report has already been submitted to the City of Valdez.

Post use sampling will also be taken of the area to confirm that there are no negative environmental impacts from CEI use.

Additional contracts for Summer 2026 are anticipated and utilization of the property next year for the same use is the goal of securing a 2-year lease.

The intent was to share a barge with the City of Valdez on September 22nd. Unfortunately for both CEI and the City of Valdez the barge did not accept the loads. CEI is continuing to look into other barging options but due to the time of year it does not appear that one will be available until next summer. Our intent will be the same in the summer of 2026 and we would share the barge with the City of Valdez to move the scrap metal.

Re: Liquidation of city assets

The City of Valdez' drone program began in 2019/2020 by organizing participating city departments into one program (Capital Facilities, Community Development, Police, Fire, and Ports and Harbor. At the time, the original two pilots were flying used meager drones that needed replacement, and the police department had purchased one new and one used DJI Matrice 210.

By combining departments into one program and budget, we were able to acquire contemporary drones that better met the city's needs, such as airframes that were waterproof, more portable, with more capable sensors, and with quicker set-up/deployment times.

The two M210s are outdated, and their firmware is no longer completely supported by DJI. They are not waterproof, and they take some time to set up. The city team presently flies drones that have replaced these older aircraft, and it is time to decommission them from our fleet. On public sites they average used (with peripheral attachments) anywhere from approximately \$3000-5000 and on the government site the city uses to liquidate assets anywhere from \$1500-2500 each. We recently became aware the City of Skagway, AK is looking to begin a drone program. Because of the above stated reasons, our city program is seeking the council's permission to gift these two drones to Skagway, in order for them to begin their program and learn their needs prior to purchasing new equipment.

In 2025, the City of Valdez Economic Development Department advanced key priorities in childcare, workforce development, business support, tourism, and transportation. Highlights include creating childcare start-up and operating grants, managing a \$3 million HUD award for a new childcare facility, and hosting the successful Valdez Small Business Conference and Business Builder Workshop. The department strengthened partnerships with regional organizations, expanded workforce and STEAM initiatives with PWSC, Valdez City Schools, and T3 Alliance, and supported tourism growth through new interpretive signage in Old Town, visitor studies, and cruise line expansion. Eleven community service organization events were supported, and essential air service continuity was secured through coordination with USDOT and the State of Alaska. Collectively, these efforts strengthened Valdez's economy, workforce, and visibility as a vibrant community and destination.

Executive Summary

From **July through September 2025**, the Alaska Women's Business Center (AWBC) and **Business Impact Northwest (BINW)** expanded entrepreneurial capacity in Valdez through hands-on training, one-on-one coaching, and statewide visibility opportunities. Throughout Q3, AWBC supported approximately **50 Valdez-area entrepreneurs** through a mix of in-person and virtual coaching, workshops, and community events—representing nearly **100 points of engagement** across the quarter. This reflects increased accessibility, visibility, and trust in AWBC's no-cost business support model.

This report provides a **Q3 progress snapshot (July–September 2025)**. Year-to-date and cumulative data will be compiled after Q4 for inclusion in the **2025 Annual Report**.


Two milestones defined the quarter:




