SUMMARY STATEMENT:

Recreational Vehicle and Tent Camping is addressed in Title 10 of the Valdez Municipal Code. Chapter 10.20 has not been amended since 1996. The existing VMC 10.20.030 calls for a permit for RV Parking in designated areas of the city by permit from the City Manager's office.

Although RV camping has become more and more popular in recent years, the permit program was not implemented until last summer. Due to concerns about RVs parked in areas that are not appropriate within the City, the Chief of Police/Assistant City Manager formed a committee of department heads to explore solutions to the issue. During the summer of 2024, under the recommendation of the group, City Administration began issuing permits for a handful of designated areas as a temporary solution.

The group, which also includes the Capital Facilities Director, Community Development Director, Parks & Rec Director, Public Works Director, City Clerk, City Attorney, and Lt. Kalin King has developed a proposed draft ordinance for discussion and will present on a permit program that would pair with the ordinance, if adopted. The draft ordinance brings alignment with the recently adopted Title 17, which now includes more detailed standards for RV Parks & Campgrounds.

The staff presentation will include details regarding alignment with Title 17, proposed designated parking areas, signage, application and approval process, safety and enforcement, and options for council members to provide direction and input.

10.20.010 Purpose.

The purpose of this chapter is to set reasonable standards for recreational vehicle parks and tent camping camprounds within the city in locations other than established recreational vehicle parks and campgrounds permitted under Title 17 of this code. It is the intent of the city to assure that the public health, safety and welfare of the community is preserved and protected while not creating burdensome and unduly restrictive regulations that would deter recreational vehicle travelers and tent campers from visiting Valdez. (Ord. 96-09 § 1 (part))

10.20.020 Definitions.

As used in this chapter:

"Recreational vehicle" means a vehicular-type unit primarily designed as temporary living quarters for recreational, camping, or travel use, or other temporary occupancy use, which either has its own motive power, or is mounted on or drawn by another vehicle. Examples include the basic entities are: travel trailer, camping trailer, truck camper, and motor home, and other similar vehicles.

"Recreational vehicle park or campground" means a lot or portion of a lot plot of land upon which where two or more recreational vehicles or tents are parked, camped, leased or rented for located, established or maintained for occupancy by recreational vehicles of the general public as temporary living quarters temporary living quarters occupancy for recreation or vacation purposes. A recreational vehicle park or campground may be improved or unimproved providing remote, rural or nonrural settings that may or may not include improvements and amenities such as water, showers, electricity, a dump station, cable television, internet service or similar services.

"Recreational vehicle site" means a plot of ground within a recreational vehicle park intended for the accommodation of a recreational vehicle, at tent, or other individual camping unit on a temporary basis.

"Designated area" means any designated area of land owned or controlled by the City other than established recreational vehicle parks or campgrounds identified by the City Manager as suitable for temporary recreational vehicle camping in compliance with this Chapter.

"Tent" means a portable, collapsible, enclosed shelter made of canvas or nylon, or comparable material, stretched and sustained by poles, which has been specifically designed and manufactured for temporary use for camping.

<u>"Tent Camper"</u> <u>"Tenter"</u> shall be defined as a person or party or persons camping in a tent or in the open.

"Tent campground" shall be defined as an area, lot or portion of a lot where two or more recreational vehicles are parked or camped for temporary occupancy. (Ord. 96-09 § 1 (part))

10.20.030 Use and parking of recreational vehicles outside of a recreational vehicle park.

- A. No recreational vehicle may be parked <u>and occupied</u> on city streets <u>or</u> in areas where such prohibition is posted or otherwise prohibited by the code.
- B. No recreational vehicles may be parked and occupied in city parking lots or and on other city controlled property except in designated areas and after without obtaining a permit for that purpose from the city manager or his designee. A permit may be obtained by submitting an application in the form and manner prescribed by the City Manager. Permits under this section shall not exceed 3 days.
- C. One recreational vehicle vehicles may be parked for temporary occupancy on a lot in residential zoning districts R1, R2, RR, and NMU for a period of no longer than 30 days. all single-family residential zone districts Such occupancy must be with the owner's permission and in compliance with applicable laws.
- D. One recreational vehicle may be parked for temporary occupancy with water and sewer hookups on a lot in <u>commercial zoning districts CB and G for a period of no longer than 180 days</u>. all commercial-zoned districts Such occupancy must be with the owner's permission and in compliance with applicable laws.
- E. Except as provided otherwise, it is a violation of this code for a person in charge of a premises within the city to permit or allow camping without a valid permit from the city and if required, a state of Alaska Public Accommodation Permit.
- E. Up to three recreational vehicles may be parked for overnight camping on property belonging to a local private club or lodge for a period of no longer than three days provided the following conditions are met:
- 1. Sufficient off-street parking remains for patrons of the establishment;
- 2. The recreational vehicles are fully self-contained;
- 3. The private club or lodge has granted permission for overnight parking; and
- 4. The owners of the recreational vehicles must be out-of-town members of the local private club or lodge.
- F. Camping not in conformance with this Chapter may be permitted pursuant to VMC Section 17.12.120 entitled Temporary Land Use Permits.

10.20.040 Location.

Recreational vehicle parks are permitted in the public lands zoning district; are allowed as a conditional use in the commercial residential zoning district, the general commercial zoning district, and the light industrial zoning district. (Ord. 96-09 § 1 (part))

10.20.050 Recreational vehicle park standards.

- A. Standards Generally. Recreational vehicle parks shall meet the design and performance standards set forth herein as well as those mandated by state and local law. Such standards include but are not limited to those regulating wastewater disposal, drinking water and restrooms. The facilities must be in compliance with all building, plumbing, electrical, fire and other applicable codes.
- B. Site Plan. The applicant shall provide a site plan drawn at a scale in which all of the requirements of this section are clearly shown. In addition, the following shall be shown:
- 1. Name of the recreational vehicle park or campground, ownership, name of developer, scale, north arrow, date, and location map showing the location of the park or campground;
- 2. Identification of each recreational vehicle site by number.
- C. Separation Requirements. The following requirements shall apply to all buildings, structures and recreational vehicles within a park or campground.
- 1. Distance Between Structures and Recreational Vehicles. The minimum side to-side spacing between recreational vehicles and/or other permitted buildings or structures and any subsequent additions thereto shall not be less than ten feet.
- 2. Site Width. Each recreational vehicle site shall not be less than ten feet plus the width of the recreational vehicle.
- D. Design of Entrances and Exits. Entrances and exits shall be designed for safe and convenient movement of traffic into and out of the park, and to minimize hazards with traffic on adjacent streets. No entrance or exit shall require a turn at an acute angle for vehicles moving in the direction intended. No object or material impediment to visibility shall be created, placed or maintained which obscures the view of an approaching driver in the right lane of the street. No entrance or exit shall be located nearer than thirty feet from any street intersection, or ten feet from the radius point, whichever is more.
- E. Internal Streets. Streets shall be provided in the park or campground where necessary to furnish principal trafficways for safe and convenient access to all sites and to facilities for common use by park or campground occupants.
- F. Street Alignment and Gradient. Street alignment and gradient shall be designed and constructed to ensure the safe movement of traffic, and to satisfactorily control surface water.
- G. Street Surfacing. Streets shall consist of a sound all-weather driving surface consisting of gravel, cinders, asphalt or concrete.
- H. Street Widths. Internal streets shall meet the following minimum size standards:
- 1. Twenty feet wide access road in front of or behind each site;

- 2. Street widths at access points where traffic enters or leaves the park, shall be of sufficient size to permit free movement from or to the stream of traffic on the adjacent public streets, and no parking shall be permitted which in any way interferes with such free movement.
- I. Disposal of Sewage and Providing of Water. Disposal of wastewater and providing of drinking water shall comply with the Uniform Plumbing Code as adopted by the city. (Ord. 96-09 § 1 (part))

10.20.040 Tent camping prohibited—Exceptions.

No tent tenters campers shall camp in the city, except tent tenters campers who:

- A. Camp in <u>established recreational vehicle parks or campgrounds</u>. designated areas within the city;
- B. Camp in tent campgrounds approved by the city as camping areas.
- C. Camp not less than one-quarter mile from any roadway, or not less than one hundred yards from any public trail, unless posted "No Camping" or "No Trespassing";
- B.D. Camp on private property with the permission of the owner, limited to no more than two tents for a period not to exceed 30 days. (Ord. 96-09 § 1 (part))

10.20.<u>050</u> Penalties.

The penalty for violations of this chapter shall be as reflected in the fine schedule set forth in this section. Court appearance is optional upon citation for a violation of those sections of this chapter that appear in the fine schedule set out in Section 1.08.030 and as reflected in the fine schedule set forth in this section.

10.20.070 Other requirements for tent camping in public areas.

- A. Tenters shall maintain and keep the tent area:
- 1. In a clean, orderly and sanitary condition at all times; and
- 2. Free of any hazard or condition which could affect the health and safety of the occupants or the general public; and
- 3. Free of refuse while camping and all refuse must be disposed of before leaving the camping area; and
- 4. Free of conditions which could tend to attract, harbor or breed insects, pests or wildlife.
- B. The following shall not be permitted:

- 1. Tents that do not fall within the definition of "tent" as set forth in Section 10.20.020(D). Types of shelters or structures that are not permitted include, but are not limited to, those that are not portable or collapsible and those not made of canvas or nylon or comparable material. Shelters or structures made of wood, cardboard, visqueen or porous materials are expressly prohibited.
- 2. Tenters are prohibited from bringing dogs into or keeping dogs in any tent campground posted off limits to dogs by order of the city manager. (Ord. 96-09 § 1 (part))

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

Under Alaska Statute (AS 29.45.030) and Valdez Municipal Code (VMC 3.12.030), real property owned and occupied as the primary residence by a disabled veteran is exempt from taxation on the first one hundred and fifty thousand dollars of the assessed value of the real property.

The property owner is required by statute and code to file <u>annually</u> for the exemption on a standard form provided by the state of Alaska. The annual application must be filed no later than January 15th of the assessment year for which the exemption is sought.

Applications are filed with the City Clerk's Office for processing and acceptance. If the annual application is filed before the deadline and the applicant meets the exemption program requirements, the City Clerk's Office processes the applicant's paperwork and the exemption is then automatically applied to the appropriate property tax account.

Under Valdez Municipal Code (VMC 3.12.030(3)(a)), only the City Council holds the authority to waive the annual January 15th application deadline for this exemption program. The City Council, for demonstrated good cause, may waive the applicant's failure to make timely application for the current year and authorize the City Clerk's Office to accept the application as if timely filed.

Approve 2025 Community Purpose Property Tax Exemption applications.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

The property of an organization not organized for business or profit-making purposes and used **exclusively** for community purposes may be exempt from taxation under Valdez Municipal Code 3.12.050. The property must also be open to the public and not require membership or a fee to access.

Note: That portion of the property regularly used for commercial purposes other than the organization's exempt purpose shall be subject to taxation by the City.

To qualify for the exemption, the applicant must file with the City Clerk's Office a written application no later than January 15th of the assessment year for which the exemption is sought. Applicants must use a standard form provided by the City.

Community purpose property tax exemptions must be approved by the City Council annually. An exemption granted shall only be for the assessment year for which the exemption is sought.



SUMMARY STATEMENT:

City Manager John Douglas, Capital Facilities Director Nate Duval and Deputy City Clerk Elise Sorum-Birk have had preliminary conversations with Chugachmiut's Head Start Coordinator Krisitin Ramstad and Deputy Director Phyllis Wimberley about the possibility of their program partnering with the city to operate in the new early childhood education/ child care facility to be constructed by the City of Valdez.

As a federally funded early childhood education program, Chugachmuit's Head Start programing would complement the existing pre-K programing offered by Valdez City Schools and the Valdez Coop Preschool. The program would also benefit families by operating year-round for 8 hours a day and having toddler aged classrooms (early head start).

The next step in moving forward with Chugachmiut Head Start as the operator will be to draft a Memorandum of Agreement outlining expectations of both parties during the construction process.



BASIC SERVICES

Provide all professional services necessary to provide the City of Valdez:

Consultant shall express an opinion on the fair presentation of the City's general purpose financial statements conforming with generally accepted accounting principles.

To meet the requirements of this Agreement, the audit shall be performed in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards as set forth by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, the standards for financial audits set forth in the U.S. General Accounting Office's *Government Auditing Standards*, the provisions of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance). The audit shall also be performed in accordance with the *State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits*.

The scope of services to be provided are more fully described in the Engagement Letter from Consultant dated December 20, 2024, which is incorporated herein by reference.

Appendix B Basis of Compensation

On completion of work and submission of invoices, the City shall pay to Consultant the compensation as follows:

Payment shall be made based on the proposed fee and shall not exceed \$94,800 for the 2024 audit and \$98,700 for the 2025 audit, per the proposal attached to Appendix A of this Agreement, without prior authorization by the City as required in Section V of the General Conditions (Appendix C).



Appendix C General Conditions

I. Definitions:

<u>Basic Services:</u> The identified work elements set forth in this Agreement for which the Consultant will receive prime compensation.

<u>Change:</u> An addition to, or reduction of, or other revision in the scope, complexity, character, or duration of the services or other provisions of this Agreement.

<u>City's Project Manager:</u> City's representative in charge of the project(s) and the consultant's primary point of contact for notice(s) to proceed, invoices, correspondence and interface with the City.

<u>Consultant's Project Manager:</u> The Consultant's representative in charge of the project(s) who is directly responsible and engaged in performing the required services.

<u>Extra Services:</u> Any services or actions required of the Consultant above and beyond provisions of this Agreement.

<u>Funding Agency(s)</u>: The agency(s) of the federal, state or municipal government which furnishes funds for the Consultant's compensation under this Agreement.

Optional Services: Identifiable and/or indeterminate work elements set forth in this Agreement, which are separate and distinct from those covered by the prime compensation, which the City has the option to authorize.

<u>Prime Compensation:</u> The dollar amount paid to the Consultant for basic services set forth in this Agreement. Prime compensation does not include payment for any optional or extra services.

<u>Scope of Work:</u> Basic and optional services required of the Consultant by provisions of this Agreement.

<u>Subconsultant:</u> Any person, firm, corporation, joint venture, partnership or other entity engaged through or by Consultant.



II. Information and Services from Others:

Provisions of information, data, budget, standards, and other materials by the City do not warrant their accuracy or quality nor provide approval of omissions or oversights or of any non-compliance with applicable regulation.

The City may, at its election, or in response to a request from the Consultant, furnish information or services from other Consultants. If, in the Consultant's opinion, such information or services are inadequate, the Consultant must notify the City of the specific service or material deemed inadequate and the extent of the inadequacy prior to use in the performance of this Agreement. Unless so notified by the Consultant, the City may assume the information or services provided are adequate.

III. Indemnification

To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Consultant shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City from and against any claim of, or damages, losses, expenses and liability (including but not limited to fees and charges of engineers, architects, attorneys, and other professionals, and court, mediation and/or arbitration costs) for negligent acts, errors, and omissions of the Consultant, Subconsultant, persons or organizations directly or indirectly employed or engaged by Consultant or Subconsultant under this Agreement. The Consultant is not required to indemnify, defend, or hold harmless the City for a claim of, or liability for the independent negligent acts, errors, and omissions of the City. If there is a claim of, or liability for a joint negligent act, error, or omission of the Consultant and the City, the indemnification, defense, and hold harmless obligation of this provision shall be apportioned on a comparative fault basis. In this provision, "Consultant" and "City" include the employees, agents, and contractors who are directly responsible, respectively, to each. In this provision, "independent negligent acts, errors, and omissions" means negligence other than in the City's selection, administration, monitoring, or controlling of the Consultant, or in approving or accepting the Consultant's work.

IV. Insurance:

All of the insurance coverages listed in Article 5 shall be purchased by the Consultant. The City shall be made an additional insured on the Consultants Commercial General Liability policy in connection with the activities related to this contract. The Consultant shall purchase and maintain the Article 5 insurance coverages with limits not less than those specified for the duration of the Agreement. The professional liability insurance shall be maintained in force for one year following the date of final payment for the work performed herein. The amount of the contract may be renegotiated if the insurance premiums for the following year are raised over those in force when the contract was let. Should the professional liability insurance become unavailable during the one-year period following the date of final payment, the insurance coverage may be renegotiated between the owner and the Consultant.



Insurance coverage shall provide for negligent acts, errors or omissions which the Consultant, employees of the Consultant or Subconsultant may make which produce loss or liability to the Owner and for the protection against loss which results from reliance on the Consultant's products, reports or a combination thereof. Failure to comply with the provision for maintaining the insurance in effect for one year following the date of final payment may be cause for the Owner to refrain from dealing with the Consultant in the future.

V. Payments:

The City shall pay to the Consultant the amount of any changes in the cost of insurance that are attributable to the Scope of Work created by change orders.

Payments shall be made in accordance with Appendix B. Consultant shall submit progress invoices to City in duplicate showing the itemized services performed during the invoice period and the charges therefore.

All progress invoices shall be prepared as a percentage of the work is completed except contracts performed on "time and expenses" basis which invoiced amounts shall not exceed the actual charges to the invoice date.

Under no circumstances will City pay for charges in excess of any lump-sum or not-to-exceed contract amount incurred prior to written authorization by City for an increase in the contract amount. Written request for an increase in the contract amount shall be given to City with sufficient notice to allow City to issue formal approval prior to the incurring of excess charges without delay to the work.

On "time and expenses" contract amounts, compensation for work included in the Scope of Work shall be for direct labor costs and the actual cost of reimbursable expenses. Direct labor costs shall be as shown on the current Standard Labor Rates for the Consultant, a copy of which is attached as Appendix D, times a factor of _______, for services rendered by principals and employees of the firm. Reimbursable expenses mean the actual expenses incurred directly or indirectly in connection with the Project for: transportation and subsistence incidental thereto; obtaining bids or proposals from contractor(s); furnishing and maintaining field office facilities; toll telephone calls and telegrams; reproduction of reports, drawings, specifications, and similar project-related items and, if authorized in advance by City, overtime work requiring higher than regular rates. Reimbursable expenses shall also include the amount billed to Consultant by Subconsultant employed by consultant for such Subconsultants' services and reimbursable expenses times a factor of 1.05.

The sum of payments shall not exceed the allowable compensation stated in this Agreement. In the event items on an invoice are disputed, payment on those items will be withheld until the dispute is resolved.



The Consultant shall submit a final invoice and required documentation for services authorized by each Notice to Proceed within Ninety (90) days after final acceptance by the City. The City will not be held liable for payment of invoices submitted after this time unless prior written approval has been given.

VI. Changes:

Changes in the Scope of Work or of services may only be made by written amendment signed by both City and Consultant.

If at any time the City through its authorized representatives, either orally or in writing, requests or issues instructions for extra services or otherwise directs actions that conflict with any provisions of this Agreement, the Consultant shall, within ten (10) days of receipt and prior to pursuing such instructions, notify the City in writing, and to the extent possible, describe the scope and estimated cost of any extra services. Unless so notified by the Consultant, the City may assume such instructions have not changed any provisions of this Agreement nor require additional compensation. No additional payments shall be made to the Consultant without such notice.

VII. Audits and Records:

The Consultant shall maintain records of all performances, communications, documents, and correspondence pertinent to this Agreement, and the City of its authorized representatives shall have the right to examine such records and accounting procedures and practices.

The materials described in the Article shall be made available at the business office of the Consultant, at all reasonable times, for inspection, audit or reproduction by City or any funding agency, for a minimum of three years from the date (a) of final payment under this Agreement (b) final payment upon claims or disputes, and for such longer period, if any, as may be required by applicable statute or other provisions of this Agreement.

VIII. <u>Inspections:</u>

The City, or any funding agency, has the right to inspect, in the manner and at reasonable times it considers appropriate during the period of this Agreement, all facilities, materials and activities of the Consultant in the performance of this Agreement.

IX. <u>Termination or Suspension:</u>

This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon ten (10) days' written notice if the other party fails substantially to perform in accordance with its terms through no fault of the party initiating the termination (default termination). If the City terminates this



Agreement, the City will pay the Consultant a sum equal to the percentage of work completed that can be substantiated by the Consultant and the City. If the City becomes aware of any fault or defect in the work of the Consultant or nonconformance with this Agreement, the City will give prompt written notice thereof to the Consultant. Should the Consultant's services remain in nonconformance with this Agreement, the percentage of total compensation attributable to the nonconforming work may be withheld.

The City at any time may terminate (convenience termination) or suspend this Agreement for its own needs or convenience. In the event of a convenience termination or suspension for more than three months, the Consultant will be compensated for authorized services and authorized expenditures performed to the date of receipt of written notice of termination plus reasonable termination expenses. NO fee or other compensation for the uncompleted portion of the services will be paid, except for already incurred indirect costs which the Consultant can establish and which would have been compensated for over the life of this Agreement, but because of the convenience termination would have to be absorbed by the Consultant without further compensation.

If state or federal funds support this Agreement, settlement in the event of default or convenience termination must be approved by the City and any appropriate state or federal agency.

X. Officials Not to Benefit:

No member of or delegate to Congress, United States Commissioner or other officials of federal, state or local government shall be admitted to any share or part of this Agreement or any benefit to arise therefrom. The Consultant warrants that it has not employed or retained any organization or person, other than a bona fide employee working for the Consultant, to solicit or secure this Agreement and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any consideration contingent upon or resulting from this Agreement.

XI. Independent Consultant:

Except in those instances specifically provided for herein, the Consultant and any of its agents and employees shall act in an independent capacity and not as agents of the City in the performance of the Agreement.

XII. Ownership of Work Products:

Work products produced under this Agreement, except items that have preexisting copyrights, are the property of the City. Payments to the Consultant for services hereunder include full compensation for all work products, field notes, interim work, reports, and other materials produced by the Consultant and its Subconsultants pertaining to this Agreement. Any re-use the City might make of these work products shall be at the City's own risk and the



Consultant shall not incur any liability for the City's re-use of the work products on any project for which they were not intended.

XIII. Subconsultants, Successors and Assigns:

The City must concur in the selection of all Subconsultants for professional services to be engaged in performance of this Agreement.

As soon as practicable after the award of the contract, the Consultant shall furnish to the City in writing the names of the proposed Subconsultants for each of the principal portions of the work. The City shall promptly notify the Consultant if it has reasonable objection to any of the proposed Subconsultants. Failure of the City to give prompt notification shall constitute notice of no reasonable objection. The Consultant shall not contract with any Subconsultant to whom the City has made reasonable objection.

If this Agreement includes named firms or individuals, then such firms or individuals shall be employed for the designated services, unless the Agreement is changed by amendment.

The Consultant shall not assign, sublet or transfer any interest in this Agreement without the prior written consent of the City.


The Consultant binds itself, its partners, its Subconsultants, assigns and legal representatives to this Agreement and to the successors, assigns and legal representatives of the City with respect to all covenants of this Agreement.

The Consultant shall include provisions appropriate to effectuate the purposes of this Appendix C in all subcontracts executed to perform services under this Agreement in which subcontract amount exceeds \$40,000.

XIV. Claims and Disputes:

If the Consultant becomes aware, or reasonably should have become aware of any act or occurrence which may form the basis of a claim, the consultant shall immediately inform the City's Project Manager. If the matter cannot be resolved within seven (7) days, the Consultant shall within the next fourteen (14) days submit written notice of the facts which may form the basis of the claim.


In addition, all claims by the Consultant for additional compensation or an extension of the time for performance of any dispute regarding a question of fact or interpretation of this Agreement shall be presented in writing by the Consultant to the City's Project Manager within the next sixty (60) days unless the Project Manager agrees in writing to an extension of time for good cause shown. Good cause shown includes time for the Consultant to prepare the claim, and the City's Project Manager will grant an extension of not more than



sixty (60) days for preparation of the claim. The Consultant agrees that unless these written notices are provided, the Consultant shall not be entitled to additional time or compensation for such act, event or condition. The Consultant shall in any case continue diligent performance under this Agreement. The Consultant shall in any case continue to expeditiously accomplish disputed services pending future resolution of the Consultant's claim unless notified by the City to stop work on the disputed matter.

In presenting any claim, the Consultant shall specifically include, to the extent then possible, the following:

- The provisions of this Agreement that apply to the claim and under which it is made.
- The specific relief requested including any additional compensation claimed and the basis upon which it was calculated and/or the additional time requested and the basis upon which it was calculated.
- The claim will be acknowledged in writing by the City's Project Manager. If the claim is not disposed of within sixty (60) days of acknowledgement, provided additional time is not granted in writing by the City's Contract Officer, the claim will be decided by the City's Contract Officer. The Contract Officer reserves the right to make a written request to the Consultant at any time for additional information that the Consultant may possess to support the claims(s). The Consultant agrees to provide the City such additional information within thirty (30) days of receipt for such a request. The City's Contract Officer will allow a reasonable time extension for good cause if presented in writing prior to the expiration of the thirty (30) days. Failure to furnish such additional information constitutes a waiver of claim.
- The Consultant will be furnished a written, signed copy of the Contract Officer's decision within ninety (90) days of receipt of all necessary information from the Contractor upon which to base the decision. The Contract Officer's decision is final and conclusive unless, within thirty (30) days of receipt of the decision, the Consultant delivers a notice of appeal to the City Manager. The notice of appeal shall include specific exceptions to the City's decision including specific provision of this Agreement which the Consultant intends to rely upon on appeal. General assertions that the City's decision is contrary to law or to fact are not sufficient.
- The decision of the City Manager will be rendered within 120 days of notice of appeal and the decision constitutes the exhaustion of contractual and administrative remedies.



All of the insurance coverages listed in Article 5 shall be purchased by the Consultant. The City shall be made an additional insured on the Consultants Commercial General Liability policy in connection with the activities related to this contract. The Consultant shall purchase and maintain the Article 5 insurance coverages with limits not less than those specified for the duration of the Agreement. The professional liability insurance shall be maintained in force for one year following the date of final payment for the work performed herein. The amount of the contract may be renegotiated if the insurance premiums for the following year are raised over those in force when the contract was let. Should the professional liability insurance become unavailable during the one year period following the date of final payment, the insurance coverage may be renegotiated between the owner and the Consultant. Insurance coverage shall provide for negligent acts, errors or omissions which the Consultant, employees of the Consultant or Subconsultant may make which produce loss or liability to the Owner and for the protection against loss which results from reliance on the Consultant's products, reports or a combination thereof. Failure to comply with the provision for maintaining the insurance in effect for one year following the date of final payment may be cause for the Owner to refrain from dealing with the Consultant in the future.

XV. Extent of Agreement:

This Agreement, including appendices, represents the entire and integrated Agreement between the City and the Consultant and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations or agreements, either written or oral.

Nothing contained herein may be deemed to create any contractual relationship between the City and any Subconsultants or material suppliers; nor may anything contained herein be deemed to give any third party a claim or right of action against the City or the Consultant that does not otherwise exist without regard to this Agreement.

This Agreement may be changed only by written amendment executed by both the City and the Consultant.

All communications that affect this Agreement must be made or confirmed in writing.

The Consultant receiving final payment will execute a release, if required, relinquishing in full all claims against the City arising out of or by reason of the services and work products furnished under this Agreement.

The Consultant shall pay all federal, state and local taxes incurred by the Consultant and shall require payment of such taxes by any Subconsultant or any other persons in the performance of this Agreement.



XVI. Governing Laws:

This Agreement is governed by the laws of the State of Alaska and such federal and local laws and ordinances as are applicable to work performed. Any litigation arising out of the terms of this Agreement shall be brought in the Third Judicial District, Superior or District Court at Valdez.

XVII. <u>Minimum Wages:</u>

Minimum wages as determined by the Department of Labor shall be paid to all persons performing work on this Contract.

Dear Audit Committee or Mayor,

We are pleased to confirm our understanding of the services we are to provide for City of Valdez for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Audit Scope and Objectives

We will audit the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, the aggregate discretely presented component unit, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information, including the disclosures, which collectively comprise the basic financial statements, of City of Valdez as of and for the year ended December 31, 2024. Accounting standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) provide for certain required supplementary information (RSI), to supplement City of Valdez's basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. As part of our engagement, we will apply certain limited procedures to City of Valdez's RSI in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). These limited procedures will consist of inquiries of management regarding the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We will not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient appropriate evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance. The following RSI is required by GAAP and will be subjected to certain limited procedures, but will not be audited:

- 1) Management's Discussion and Analysis.
- 2) Budgetary comparison schedules.
- 3) Schedules of proportionate share of the net pension and the OPEB liabilities (assets) and contributions.

We have also been engaged to report on supplementary information other than RSI that accompanies City of Valdez's financial statements. We will subject the following supplementary information to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS, and we will provide an opinion on it in relation to the financial statements as a whole in a separate written report accompanying our auditor's report on the financial statements or in a report combined with our auditor's report on the financial statements.

- 1) Schedule of expenditures of federal awards and related notes.
- 2) Schedule of state financial assistance and related notes.
- 3) Additional supplementary information.

The objectives of our audit are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions about whether your financial statements are fairly presented, in all material respects, in conformity with GAAP, and report on the fairness of the supplementary information referred to in the second paragraph when considered in relation to the financial statements as a whole. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements, including omissions, can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment of a reasonable user made based on the financial statements. The objectives also include reporting on:

- Internal control over financial reporting and compliance with provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and award agreements, noncompliance with which could have a material effect on the financial statements in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*.
- Internal control over compliance related to major programs and an opinion (or disclaimer of opinion) on compliance with federal and state statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal and state awards that could have a direct and material effect on each major program in accordance with the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996 and Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance) and the State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements and Single Audit

We will conduct our audit in accordance with GAAS; the standards for financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996; and the provisions of the Uniform Guidance, and the *State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits*, and will include tests of accounting records, a determination of major program(s) in accordance with Uniform Guidance, and the *State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits*, and other procedures we consider necessary to enable us to express such opinions. As part of an audit in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards*, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.

We will evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management. We will also evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and determine whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation. We will plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement, whether from (1) errors, (2) fraudulent financial reporting, (3) misappropriation of assets, or (4) violations of laws or governmental regulations that are attributable to the government or to acts by management or employees acting on behalf of the government. Because the determination of waste and abuse is subjective, *Government Auditing Standards* do not expect auditors to perform specific procedures to detect waste or abuse in financial audits nor do they expect auditors to provide reasonable assurance of detecting waste or abuse.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, combined with the inherent limitations of internal control, and because we will not perform a detailed examination of all transactions, there is an unavoidable risk that some material misstatements or noncompliance may not be detected by us, even though the audit is properly planned and performed in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards*. In addition, an audit is not designed to detect immaterial misstatements or violations of laws or governmental regulations that do not have a direct and material effect on the financial statements or on major programs. However, we will inform the appropriate level of management of any material errors, any fraudulent financial reporting, or misappropriation of assets that come to our attention. We will also inform the appropriate level of management of any violations of laws or governmental regulations that come to our attention, unless clearly inconsequential. We will include such matters in the reports required for a Single Audit. Our responsibility as auditors is limited to the period covered by our audit and does not extend to any later periods for which we are not engaged as auditors.

We will also conclude, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the government's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our procedures will include tests of documentary evidence supporting the transactions recorded in the accounts, tests of the physical existence of inventories, and direct confirmation of receivables and certain assets and liabilities by correspondence with selected individuals, funding sources, creditors, and financial institutions. We will also request written representations from your attorneys as part of the engagement.

We have identified the following significant risks of material misstatement as part of our audit planning:

- 1) Improper revenue recognition.
- 2) Management override of internal controls.

We may, from time to time and depending on the circumstances, use third-party service providers in serving your account. We may share confidential information about you with these service providers but remain committed to maintaining the confidentiality and security of your information. Accordingly, we maintain internal policies, procedures, and safeguards to protect the confidentiality of your personal information. In addition, we will secure confidentiality agreements with all service providers to maintain the confidentiality of your information and we will take reasonable precautions to determine that they have appropriate procedures in place to prevent the unauthorized release of your confidential information to others. In the event that we are unable to secure an appropriate confidentiality agreement, you will be asked to provide your consent prior to the sharing of your confidential information with the third-party service provider. Furthermore, we will remain responsible for the work provided by any such third-party service providers.

Our audit of financial statements does not relieve you of your responsibilities.

Audit Procedures—Internal Control

We will obtain an understanding of the government and its environment, including the system of internal control, sufficient to identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to error or fraud, and to design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks and obtain evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinions. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentation, or the override of internal control. Tests of controls may be performed to test the effectiveness of certain controls that we consider relevant to preventing and detecting errors and fraud that are material to the financial statements and to preventing and detecting misstatements resulting from illegal acts and other noncompliance matters that have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. Our tests, if performed, will be less in scope than would be necessary to render an opinion on internal control and, accordingly, no opinion will be expressed in our report on internal control issued pursuant to Government Auditing Standards. As required by the Uniform Guidance, and the State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits, we will perform tests of controls over compliance to evaluate the effectiveness of the design and operation of controls that we consider relevant to preventing or detecting material noncompliance with compliance requirements applicable to each major federal and state award program. However, our tests will be less in scope than would be necessary to render an opinion on those controls and, accordingly, no opinion will be expressed in our report on internal control issued pursuant to the Uniform Guidance and the State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits.

An audit is not designed to provide assurance on internal control or to identify significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. Accordingly, we will express no such opinion. However, during the audit, we will communicate to management and those charged with governance internal control related matters that are required to be communicated under AICPA professional standards, *Government Auditing Standards*, and the Uniform Guidance and the *State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits*.

Audit Procedures—Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement, we will perform tests of City of Valdez's compliance with provisions of applicable laws, regulations, contracts, and agreements, including grant agreements. However, the objective of those procedures will not be to provide an opinion on overall compliance, and we will not express such an opinion in our report on compliance issued pursuant to *Government Auditing Standards*.

The Uniform Guidance and the State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits requires that we also plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the auditee has complied with federal and state statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal and state awards applicable to major programs. Our procedures will consist of tests of transactions and other applicable procedures described in the OMB and State Compliance Supplement for the types of compliance requirements that could have a direct and material effect on each of City of Valdez's major programs. For federal and state programs that are included in the Compliance Supplement, our compliance and internal control procedures will relate to the compliance requirements that the Compliance Supplement identifies as being subject to audit. The purpose of these procedures will be to express an opinion on City of Valdez's compliance with requirements applicable to each of its major programs in our report on compliance issued pursuant to the Uniform Guidance and the State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements and Single Audit

Our audit will be conducted on the basis that you acknowledge and understand your responsibility for (1) designing, implementing, establishing, and maintaining effective internal controls relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, including internal controls over federal and state awards, and for evaluating and monitoring ongoing activities to help ensure that appropriate goals and objectives are met; (2) following laws and regulations; (3) ensuring that there is reasonable assurance that government programs are administered in compliance with compliance requirements; and (4) ensuring that management and financial information is reliable and properly reported. Management is also responsible for implementing systems designed to achieve compliance with applicable laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements. You are also responsible for the selection and application of accounting principles; for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, schedule of state financial assistance, and all accompanying information in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; and for compliance with applicable laws and regulations (including federal and state statutes), rules, and the provisions of contracts and grant agreements (including award agreements). Your responsibilities also include identifying significant contractor relationships in which the contractor has responsibility for program compliance and for the accuracy and completeness of that information.

You are also responsible for making drafts of financial statements, schedule of expenditures of federal awards, schedule of state financial assistance, all financial records, and related information available to us; for the accuracy and completeness of that information (including information from outside of the general and subsidiary ledgers); and for the evaluation of whether there are any conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the government's ability to continue as a going concern for the 12 months after the financial statements date or shortly thereafter (for example, within an additional three months if currently known). You are also responsible for providing us with (1) access to all information of which you are aware that is relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements, such as records, documentation, identification of all related parties and all related-party relationships and transactions, and other matters; (2) access to personnel, accounts, books, records, supporting documentation, and other information as needed to perform an audit under the Uniform Guidance; and the State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits, and (3) additional information that we may request for the purpose of the audit; and (4) unrestricted access to persons within the government from whom we determine it necessary to obtain audit evidence. At the conclusion of our audit, we will require certain written representations from you about the financial statements; schedule of expenditures of federal awards; schedule of state financial assistance, federal and state award programs; compliance with laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements; and related matters.

Your responsibilities include adjusting the financial statements to correct material misstatements and confirming to us in the management representation letter that the effects of any uncorrected misstatements aggregated by us during the current engagement and pertaining to the latest period presented are immaterial, both individually and in the aggregate, to the financial statements of each opinion unit taken as a whole.

You are responsible for the design and implementation of programs and controls to prevent and detect fraud, and for informing us about all known or suspected fraud affecting the government involving (1) management, (2) employees who have significant roles in internal control, and (3) others where the fraud could have a material effect on the financial statements. Your responsibilities include informing us of your knowledge of any allegations of fraud or suspected fraud affecting the government received in communications from employees, former employees, grantors, regulators, or others. In addition, you are responsible for identifying and ensuring that the government complies with applicable laws, regulations, contracts, and grants. You are also responsible for taking timely and appropriate steps to remedy fraud and noncompliance with provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements that we report. Additionally, as required by the Uniform Guidance, and the *State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits*, it is management's responsibility to evaluate and monitor noncompliance with federal and state statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of federal and state awards; take prompt action when instances of noncompliance are identified including noncompliance identified in audit findings; promptly follow up and take corrective action on reported audit findings; and prepare a summary schedule of prior audit findings and a separate corrective action plan.

You are responsible for identifying all federal and state awards received and understanding and complying with the compliance requirements and for the preparation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, schedule of state financial assistance (including notes and noncash assistance received, and COVID-19-related concepts, such as lost revenues, if applicable) in conformity with the Uniform Guidance and the State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits. You agree to include our report on the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, schedule of state financial assistance in any document that contains, and indicates that we have reported on, the schedule of expenditures of federal awards and schedule of state financial assistance. You also agree to include the audited financial statements with any presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and schedule of state financial assistance that includes our report thereon or make the audited financial statements readily available to intended users of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards and schedule of state financial assistance, no later than the date the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, schedule of state financial assistance is issued with our report thereon. Your responsibilities include acknowledging to us in the written representation letter that (1) you are responsible for presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards and schedule of state financial assistance, in accordance with the Uniform Guidance; and the State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits, and (2) you believe the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, and schedule of state financial assistance including its form and content, is stated fairly in accordance with the Uniform Guidance; and the State of Alaska Audit Guide and Compliance Supplement for State Single Audits (3) the methods of measurement or presentation have not changed from those used in the prior period (or, if they have changed, the reasons for such changes); and (4) you have disclosed to us any significant assumptions or interpretations underlying the measurement or presentation of the schedule of expenditures of federal awards and schedule of state financial assistance.

You are also responsible for the preparation of the other supplementary information, which we have been engaged to report on, in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). You agree to include our report on the supplementary information in any document that contains, and indicates that we have reported on, the supplementary information. You also agree to include the audited financial statements with any presentation of the supplementary information that includes our report thereon or make the audited financial statements readily available to users of the supplementary information no later than the date the supplementary information is issued with our report thereon. SUMMARY STATEMENT:

Project Funding:

Currently there is only a \$2,000,000.00 unencumbered balance for this project. A budget resolution is presented within this agenda to transfer \$600,000.00 from the Rural Roads Assessment project to this project. This will bring the unencumbered balance to 2,600,000.00 to fully fund the Pavement Management Phase III-B Pioneer Drive project.

Project Name and Phasing Clarification:

The Pioneer Drive Phase III-B project is part of Pavement Management Plan Phase IV along with Meals Ave & Robe River Drive. When Meals was designated to be funded with outside Grants we prioritized Pioneer as a separate project. At the time we separated the scope, the name was modified to Phase III-B to keep the designs clearly defined and separate and to keep funding discrete. We applied for grant funding for Meals with the "Pavement Management Phase IV" and in order to not confuse grantor agencies or jeopardize outside funding Pioneer was titled Phase III-B.

Phase III-B - Pioneer (Meals to Hazelet)

Phase IV - Meals & Robe River Drive

Phase V - cul-de-sacs west of Meals

Project Description:

Base Bid - Harris Sand & Gravel Inc. will provide all labor, equipment, and materials necessary for the reconstruction of Pioneer Drive from Meals Avenue to Hazelett Avenue. The scope of work includes demolition, excavation, paving, and new concrete to reconstruct the asphalt roadway, curb/gutter, and sidewalks. Some of the existing storm drain systems will be replaced, including storm drain structures/catch basins. Replacement of three fire hydrants. Installation of new water service lines to the Subway Restaurant and KCHU Radio buildings. Demolition and Installation of new streetlights and load center. Installation of all signs and traffic markings.

A premium Asphalt mix will be used for this project. This marginally increases the overall cost of the project but will significantly increase the lifespan of the roadway. The highest quality binders, polymers and chemicals are used in the mix to improve the flexibility and strength of the asphalt pavement. Smaller aggregate is also used to make for better compaction of the asphalt. With an increase of freeze\thaw events that damage roadways in Valdez during the winter the added strength and flexibility of this asphalt will improve the lifespan of the roadway and require less annual maintenance.

Alternate #3 (included) - HDPE conduit replaces ridged conduit for the street lighting. This is a deductive cost to the project and will also save on project completion time. The HDPE conduit is easier to install, more suitable for Valdez climate, and has a longer life span.

Alternate #4 (included)- Asphalt replaces portions of concrete sidewalk. This is a deductive cost to the project and will also save on project completion time. Asphalt sidewalks are easier to install, more suitable for Valdez climate, have a longer life span, and require less maintenance.

Alternates #1 and #2 (excluded): Additive Alternate #1 - Excavation and replacement of soil west of bike path on Barney Meyring Park Strip and Additive Alternate #2 - Regrade, Level, and reseed soil east of bike path on Barney Meyring Park Strip will not be awarded to this contract. 9. Bonding Requirements

A. Bid Security (Bid Bond or Certified Check)

Section 2.80.080 of Valdez City Code provides for a modified contractor bond. Bidders shall familiarize themselves with exemptions allowed and the requirements for exemptions.

10. Bidder Qualifications

Before a bid is considered for award, the apparent low bidder may be requested to submit a statement of facts or proof in detail as to his previous experience in performing similar or comparable work, technical abilities, equipment, size, manpower and financial resources to complete and perform the work as outlined in the contract documents, plans and specifications.

11. Withdrawal of Bids

Bids may be withdrawn by written request received from the bidder prior to the bid opening time. Errors on the part of the bidder in preparing the bid, confers no right for the withdrawal of the bid after the bid has been opened.



12. Bidders Interested in More than One Bid

If any one party, by or in name of his or their agent, partner or other person, offers more than one bid, all such bids will be rejected. A party who quoted prices to a bidder is not disqualified from quoting prices to other bidders or from a bid directly for the work.

13. Rejection of Bids

The Owner reserves the right to reject any and all bids, when such rejection is in the interest of the Owner; to reject the bid of a bidder who previously failed to perform properly or to complete on time; and to reject the bid of a bidder who is not, in the opinion of the Owner in, in a position to perform the contract; or to waive any irregularities or informalities in a bid.

14. Hiring of Local Labor

The Owner encourages every Contractor and Subcontractor to employ, to the maximum extent practical and allowed by law, qualified people who regularly reside in the project area.

15. Local Bidder Preference

The Valdez City Code provides for a local bidder preference as follows:

Section 2.80.020 Definitions

"Local bidder" means a bidder that is not delinquent in the payment of any taxes, fees, assessments, or other charges owing the city and satisfies one of the requirements set forth in subsections (1) through (3) of this definition for a period of eighteen consecutive months immediately prior to the opening of a competitive city bid for which the bidder wishes to utilize the local bidder preference:

- 1. If the bidder is a corporation or limited liability company, the bidder's primary business address has a city of Valdez postal zip code, as reflected on the bidder's state of Alaska business license or the records of the State of Alaska Department of Commerce, Community and Economic Development, Division of Corporations;
- 2. If the bidder is an individual, the bidder's primary business or residential address has a city of Valdez postal zip code, as reflected on the bidder's state of Alaska business license;
- 3. If the bidder is a general partnership, a limited partnership, or a joint venture, at least one of the general partners has a postal zip code compliant with subsection (1) or (2) of this definition.

Section 2.80.065H Competitive Bidding

Except where prohibited by state or federal grant requirements, a local bidder, as defined in Section 2.80.020, may be given consideration as low bidder where the offer is the lesser of ten percent or fifty thousand dollars in excess of the lowest offer received from a bidder not qualified as a local bidder. The city may split the award between two or more suppliers in any manner the city deems to be in its best interest.



16. Award of Bid

The bid, if awarded, will be awarded to the lowest responsive responsible bidder as determined by the terms of the City Code and this document.



SP 01 General Statement

The Special Provisions set forth conditions and requirements unique to this Project and are supplemental to, and supersede, the City of Valdez "Standard Specifications and Standard Details."

SP 02 Scope of Work

Base Bid

The Scope of Work of the Base Bid of this Contract shall include providing all labor, materials, tools, equipment, transportation, supervision and facilities necessary to:

The reconstruction of Pioneer Drive from Meals Avenue to Hazelett Avenue. The scope of work includes demolition, excavation, paving, and new concrete to reconstruct the asphalt roadway, curb/gutter, and sidewalks. Some of the existing some drain systems will be replaced, including storm drain structures/catch basins. Replacement of three fire hydrants. Installation of new water service lines to the Subway Restaurant and KCHU Radio buildings. Demolition and Installation of new streetlights and load center. Installation of all signs and traffic markings.

Alternate Bid(s)

The Scope of Work of the following Additive Alternate and Alternate Bids of this Contract shall include providing all labor, materials, tools, equipment, transportation, supervision and facilities necessary to:

Additive Alternate #1 – Excavation and replacement of soil west of bike path on Barney Meyring Park Strip.

Liquidated damages will be assessed in the sum of <u>Five Hundred</u> dollars (\$500) for each calendar day after the completion date during which the Project remains incomplete.

Substantial Completion: Substantial Completion shall be defined as the stage in the progress of the work when the work is sufficiently complete in accordance with the Contract Documents so the Owner (City) can occupy or use the structure or that which is the subject of the contract, for its intended use.

SP 04 Special Site Conditions

The Contractor will be responsible for the disposal of all refuse and debris generated by the project. The City has, on a limited 'first come first served' basis, dumpsters for use free of charge on City projects if available.

Dump fees will be waived. The Contractor will be responsible for hauling demolished materials and construction waste out to the City Baler facility on South Sawmill Drive. The Baler is located approximately 5 miles out of town. Please contact the Baler ahead of time to make arrangements for the disposal of such materials. The Baler's number is 907-835-2356. The project name or contract number will be required on all Baler disposal forms and when calling to reserve or empty dumpsters.

Local building permit fees are waived. The Contractor will be responsible for obtaining any required local building permits before the NTP is issued. The Contractor will need to call the City Planning Department at 907-834-3401.

Staging area will be the City owned snow lot on the corner of Pioneer Drive and Tatitlek Avenue. Addition staging areas will be determined at the pre-construction meeting.

The Contractor will be responsible for moving furniture and other items necessary to complete the work.

The Contractor is responsible for setting up detours or barricades if their work is in a public area and will interfere with normal traffic flow.

Dust control measures will be a high priority for this project. Contractor must have a plan in place to keep dust to a minimum 7 days a week, including all holidays.

At least one access point must always be available to any businesses and/or buildings in the project area. Detours and/or optional entrances should be included in the Traffic Control Plan.



This should also include a plan for emergency vehicles/personnel access and a plan for ADA individuals who need access to the area.

The Contractor shall, within ten (10) working days of the date of the Notice to Proceed, submit to the Engineer a schedule as required in Section 10.5, Control of Work, Article 5.3. The schedule shall be updated every week. An updated schedule shall be submitted with each of the Contractor's Periodic Payment Requests. Failure to provide an updated schedule will be cause to withhold partial payment.

SP 07 Site Preservation, Restoration, Cleanup and Environmental Reporting

The Contractor shall be solely responsible for damage to public or private property caused by construction operations. The Contractor shall take all precautions necessary to control dust. The Contractor shall notify the City of any claims of damage, and shall clean and restore any property so damaged at the sole expense of the Contractor. All spills or releases of any hazardous substance shall be reported to the appropriate governmental agency as well as notice to the City. Contractor shall be responsible for all associated cleanup costs and fines.

At all times during the work, keep the premises clean and orderly. Upon completion of the work, repair all damage caused by equipment and leave the Project free of rubbish and excess materials of any kind.

SP 08 Permits

The Contractor shall obtain all licenses and permits that are required to do the work. A Building Permit will be required but there will be no charge.

A COV building permit is required for the street lighting load center installation.

SP 09 Order of Award of Alternative Bids

Additive Alternate and/or Deductive Alternative Bids will be awarded, if any are awarded, in any order determined to be the most advantageous combination by the owner.



SP 10 Payment

Payments shall be in accordance with Section 10.07, Measurement and Payment of the CVSS. All invoices for payment must be submitted on a City of Valdez *Periodic Payment Request Form*. An electronic copy of this form (Excel Spreadsheet) will be made available for the Contractor's use.

Disbursement of money to a person, firm or corporation will be made only after all the various receivable accounts of the general government and any municipal utility or enterprise have been reviewed for outstanding balances owed, and the disbursement will be reduced by setting off the amount of any delinquent indebtedness due the city from such person, firm or corporation.

All contracts to which the city is a party which will or may involve the disbursement of city funds shall contain the following clause, or its substantial equivalent: "Disbursement of money by the City of Valdez hereunder shall subject to set-off pursuant to the provisions of the Valdez City Code." Such contracts include, but are not limited to, oral contracts, employment contracts, construction contracts, purchasing contracts and contracts of any municipal utility or enterprise, including customer's deposits.


SP 11 References to City of Valdez Standard Specifications (CVSS)

The City of Valdez Standard Specifications & Standard Details, Streets-Drainage-Utilities-Parks, dated April 2003, hereafter referred to as CVSS, are incorporated in and become a part of the Contract Documents for the work, The Standard Specifications are available for purchase from the Engineer's Office of the City of Valdez, P.O. Box 307, Valdez, Alaska 99686 or can be downloaded from the City's website at https://www.valdezak.gov/228/Capital-Projects-Engineering. All work under this Contract shall comply with the latest edition and addenda to all applicable codes, ordinances, and standards.



Article 7.5 Progress Payments


Add the following:

Any request for payments for work accomplished within the calendar fiscal year (January 1st to December 31st) must be received by the city no later than January 31st of the following year. Failure to provide a request for payment by Jan. 31st for work accomplished the previous year will delay payment. Failure to provide a request for payment by January 31st for work accomplished the previous year will be subject to a penalty. Penalty may be assessed at a minimum of \$1000 and up to 5% of the invoice not to exceed \$10,000.

Article 7.7 Final Payments

Add the following:

Any request for final payment for work accomplished within the calendar fiscal year (January 1st to December 31st) must be received by the city no later than January 31st of the following year. Failure to provide a request for final payment by January 31st for work accomplished the previous year will delay payment. In accordance with the requirements of AS 36.05.070 and AS 36.05.080, the following provisions are included where applicable:

- (1) The Contractor or subcontractors of the Contractor shall pay all employees unconditionally and not less than once a week;
- (2) wages may not be less than those stated in the advertised specifications, regardless of the contractual relationship between the Contractor or subcontractors and laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors;
- (3) the scale of wages to be paid shall be posted by the Contractor in a prominent and easily accessible place at the site of the work;
- (4) Owner shall withhold so much of the accrued payments as is necessary to pay to laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors employed by the Contractor or subcontractors the difference between
- (A) the rates of wages required by the contract to be paid laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors on the work; and
 - (B) the rates of wages in fact received by laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors.

This Addendum makes the following changes and/or clarifications:

Clarification: Only "Section 60.19 Existing Structure Cleaning and Inspection", of the Special Provision/Modifications to the City of Valdez Standard Specification apply to this project. Disregard all other sections of the sections of this document that were included in the invitation to bid.

Please see the attached document titled "Revised Special Provision - Pavement Management Phase IIB Pioneer Drive" for bidding and construction purposes.

Clarification: A TTCP (Temporary Traffic Control Plan) for the work at the intersection of Pioneer Drive and Hazlett Avenue has been provided by DOWL with guidance from the Alaska Department of Transportation. The Contractor must follow these minimum requirements noted in the DOWL TTCP Sheet (See Attached).

The contractor is still required to submit a complete TCP for the entire project with the DOWL TTCP sheet included. Please see the attached DOWL TTCP Sheet.

All costs associated with these requirements shall be added to line item #43 Traffic Maintenance (TCP) in the bid Schedule.

Ouestions:

1) How many existing Storm Drain structures will the City of Valdez like to be coated and would they like any of the new structures coated?

<u>Response:</u> New structures should be installed per COV specifications, including any coatings. Existing structures shall be cleaned and inspected per plans.

2) Is the City providing the Hydrant Assembly per City Spec 60-6 or to what extent?

Response: Yes, all Hydrants are owner furnished.

3) Could a 4" HDPE or Ductile Line with two 2" inch lines "T'd" off to each building services be used instead of 2-2" inch Copper lines to each building?

<u>Response:</u> Yes, 4" HDPE or Ductile pipe is an acceptable alternative. However, two 2" copper service lines will still be required to connect to each building with individual shut-off valves. The 4' line that T's off main water line must also have its own valve. A thaw wire will also be required on the 4" line whether it's HDPE or Ductile pipe.

4) There are two items in the bid schedule for retaining wall removal and retaining wall replacement, items 29 and 30. Could a typical width & height be added to the length?

Response: Retaining wall in items 29 and 30 is a landscape block wall located at ~Sta 112+10, in front of the Prince William Sound College Maintenance Building. It consists of two to three rows of landscape blocks. If new landscape blocks are required, they shall be of the same make and model as the existing ones.

5) It shows stairs in front of Subway to be replaced. That is their ADA Ramp access. Would you still want stairs, or could we get a typical for the ADA ramp that would be required?

<u>Response</u>: The existing ADA ramp to the subway in this location is out of compliance and cannot be restored in its existing configuration. The configuration shown in the plans includes stairs and a ramp. See plan sheet C-301. Stair detail is shown on C-404.

6) Are we to assume that all work is to be done to Valdez Standard Spec only except for the camera inspections of the piping?

<u>Response:</u> Correct – there is also a special specification for cleaning and inspecting water valves.

7) Could we get a line item for the curb & ADA ramps, as well as the stairs on the bid schedule. Or would you like us to include them with the sidewalk bid item & how will those be paid for in the project.

<u>Response:</u> Curb, Ramps, and Stair shall be incorporated into line items 12 and 13 for curb and gutter and PCC sidewalk. Estimated quantity accounts for 6" ramp and landings.

8) What is the diameter of the existing water main line on Pioneer Drive in front of the Subway and Radio Station buildings?

<u>Response</u>: The water main line in front of these buildings is presumed to be 8inches in diameter. If this is found to be incorrect during construction, then changes will be made in the field including costs of time and materials.

SECTION 60.19 EXISTING STRUCTURE CLEANING AND INSPECTION

Article 19.1 Valve Cleaning and Inspection

Existing valves are to be cleared of any debris. Contractor to perform test valve actuation and record any observations. Contractor shall provide inspection footage of the valve and observations to the engineer for review and acceptance. Engineer will review footage and provide recommendation regarding additional required maintenance or valve replacement.

Article 19.2 Submittals

Submittals are to be provided to the Engineer for review and acceptance as stated in Division 10, Section 10.05, Article 5.6 – Product Data. Submittals, at a minimum, are to include applicable items identified below:

- Contractor shall submit well-lit before and after photos of each valve box cleaned.
- Annotated plan set showing location of each valve box serviced with corresponding identification number that aligns with photos.
- Notes of any deficiencies observed, i.e. missing lid or dust pan, misaligned riser casing and valve box, valves that are frozen and cannot be actuated, etc. Deficiencies shall be captured in photos to the extent feasible.



Questions:

- 1) The contract documents call for 10' arms, but the drawings call for 6' arms. Can you please confirm with Frontier what length is needed? Past phases used poles with 10' arms?
 - Response The light pole arms shall be 10' in length. The contractor shall bid a unit and total price for "Line Item #35 10' Mast Arm" as it is posted on Bid Express. Sheet E-001 for both phases will be revised to call out the 10' mast arms but will not be available to the contractor until after bid opening and the contract is awarded.
- 2) Past projects used triangular 3-bolt pole bases. New MOA specs call for square 4-bolt bases. Are we to quote to match previous phases, using triangular 3-bolt pole bases with the old specs?

<u>Response</u> - Yes, the intent was to match the pole bases from previous phases. 3-bolt pattern is sufficient.

2b) Or are we to quote per the NEW MOA specs?

<u>Response</u> - No, the 3-bolt pattern per the old MOA standards and past COV paving projects is sufficient.

3) The current City of Valdez ITB project# 25-310-1118 "Valdez Pvmt Rehab phase III B" contains a number of ambiguities in the Street Lighting specification section 26 50 00 B(materials) paragraph 4. I expect that this may have been due to a February 2024 update of the Muni. of Anchorage M.A.S.S. detail sheets that went unnoticed or were not published at the time the specs for your project were put together?

<u>Response</u> - To align with the previous paving project light poles, please use the pre-2024 MOA MASS details for this project. We have used strikethroughs on the 2024 details below that are not to be utilized for this project.

TO ALL CONTRACTING AGENCIES:

At the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development our goal is putting Alaskans to work. This pamphlet is designed to help contractors awarded public construction contracts understand the most significant laws of the State of Alaska pertaining to prevailing wages.

This pamphlet identifies current prevailing wage rates for public construction contracts (any construction projects awarded for the State of Alaska or its political subdivisions, such as local governments and certain non-profit organizations). Because these rates may change in a subsequent determination, please be sure you are using the appropriate rates. The rates published in this edition become effective September 1, 2024.

The prevailing wage rates contained in this pamphlet are applicable to public construction projects with a final bid date of September 11, 2024, or later. As the law now provides, these rates will remain stable during the life of a contract or for 24 calendar months, whichever is shorter. **The 24-month period begins on the date the prime contract is awarded.** Upon expiration of the initial 24-month period, the <u>latest</u> wage rates issued by the department shall become effective for a subsequent 24-month period or until the original contract is completed, whichever occurs first. This process shall be repeated until the original contract is completed.

The term "original contract" means the signed contract that resulted from the original bid and any amendments, including changes of work scope, additions, extensions, change orders, and other instruments agreed to by the parties that have not been subject to subsequent open bid procedures.

If a higher federal rate is required due to partial federal funding or other federal participation, the higher rate must be paid.

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Note to Readers: The statutes and administrative regulations listed in this publication were taken from the official codes, as of the effective date of the publication. However, there may be errors or omissions that have not been identified and changes that occurred after the publication was printed. This publication is intended as an informational guide only and is not intended to serve as a precise statement of the statutes and regulations of the State of Alaska. To be certain of current laws and regulations, please refer to the official codes.

EXCERPTS FROM ALASKA LAW

Sec. 36.05.005. Applicability.

This chapter applies only to a public construction contract that exceeds \$25,000.

Sec. 36.05.010. Wage rates on public construction.

A contractor or subcontractor who performs work on a public construction contract in the state shall pay not less than the current prevailing rate of wages for work of a similar nature in the region in which the work is done. The current prevailing rate of wages is that contained in the latest determination of prevailing rate of wages issued by the Department of Labor and Workforce Development at least 10 days before the final date for submission of bids for the contract. The rate shall remain in effect for the life of the contract or for 24 calendar months, whichever is shorter. At the end of the initial 24-month period, if new wage determinations have been issued by the department, the latest wage determination shall become effective for the next 24-month period or until the contract is completed, whichever occurs first. This process shall be repeated until the contract is completed.

Sec. 36.05.040. Filing schedule of employees, wages paid, and other information.

All contractors or subcontractors who perform work on a public construction contract for the state or for a political subdivision of the state shall, before the Friday of every second week, file with the Department of Labor and Workforce Development a sworn affidavit for the previous reporting period, setting out in detail the number of persons employed, wages paid, job classification of each employee, hours worked each day and week, and other information on a form provided by the Department of Labor and Workforce Development.

Sec. 36.05.045. Notice of work and completion; withholding of payment.

- (a) Before commencing work on a public construction contract, the person entering into the contract with a contracting agency shall designate a primary contractor for purposes of this section. Before work commences, the primary contractor shall file a notice of work with the Department of Labor and Workforce Development. The notice of work must list work to be performed under the public construction contract by each contractor who will perform any portion of work on the contract and the contract price being paid to each contractor. The primary contractor shall pay all filing fees for each contractor performing work on the contract, including a filing fee based on the contract price being paid for work performed by the primary contractor's employees. The filing fee payable shall be the sum of all fees calculated for each contractor. The filing fee shall be one percent of each contractor's contract price. The total filing fee payable by the primary contractor under this subsection may not exceed \$5,000. In this subsection, "contractor" means an employer who is using employees to perform work on the public construction contract under the contract or a subcontract.
- (b) Upon completion of all work on the public construction contract, the primary contractor shall file with the Department of Labor and Workforce Development a notice of completion together with payment of any additional filing fees owed due to increased contract amounts. Within 30 days after the department's receipt of the primary contractor's notice of completion, the department shall inform the contracting agency of the amount, if any, to be withheld from the final payment.
- (c) A contracting agency
 - (1) may release final payment of a public construction contract to the extent that the agency has received verification from the Department of Labor and Workforce Development that
 - (A) the primary contractor has complied with (a) and (b) of this section;
 - (B) the Department of Labor and Workforce Development is not conducting an investigation under this title; and
 - (C) the Department of Labor and Workforce Development has not issued a notice of a violation of this chapter to the primary contractor or any other contractors working on the public construction contract; and

- (2) shall withhold from the final payment an amount sufficient to pay the department's estimate of what may be needed to compensate the employees of any contractors under investigation on this construction contract, and any unpaid filing fees.
- (d) The notice and filing fee required under (a) of this section may be filed after work has begun if
 - (1) The public construction contract is for work undertaken in immediate response to an emergency; and
 - (2) The notice and fees are filed not later than 14 days after the work has begun.
- (e) A false statement made on a notice required by this section is punishable under AS 11.56.210.

Sec. 36.05.060. Penalty for violation of this chapter.

A contractor who violates this chapter is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction is punishable by a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000, or by imprisonment for not less than 10 days nor more than 90 days, or by both. Each day a violation exists constitutes a separate offense.

Sec. 36.05.070. Wage rates in specifications and contracts for public works.

- (a) The advertised specifications for a public construction contract that requires or involves the employment of mechanics, laborers, or field surveyors must contain a provision stating the minimum wages to be paid various classes of laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors and that the rate of wages shall be adjusted to the wage rate under <u>AS 36.05.010</u>.
- (b) Repealed by §17 ch 142 SLA 1972.
- (c) A public construction contract under (a) of this section must contain provisions that
 - (1) the contractor or subcontractors of the contractor shall pay all employees unconditionally and not less than once a week;
 - (2) wages may not be less than those stated in the advertised specifications, regardless of the contractual relationship between the contractor or subcontractors and laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors;
 - (3) the scale of wages to be paid shall be posted by the contractor in a prominent and easily accessible place at the site of the work;
 - (4) the state or a political subdivision shall withhold so much of the accrued payments as is necessary to pay to laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors employed by the contractor or subcontractors the difference between
 - (A) the rates of wages required by the contract to be paid laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors on the work; and
 - (B) the rates of wages in fact received by laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors.

Sec. 36.05.080. Failure to pay agreed wages.

Every contract within the scope of AS 36.05.070 shall contain a provision that if it is found that a laborer, mechanic, or field surveyor employed by the contractor or subcontractor has been or is being paid a rate of wages less than the rate of wages required by the contract to be paid, the state or its political subdivision may, by written notice to the contractor, terminate the contractor's right to proceed with the work or the part of the work for which there is a failure to pay the required wages and to prosecute the work to completion by contract or otherwise, and the contractor and the contractor's sureties are liable to the state or its political subdivision for excess costs for completing the work.

Sec. 36.05.090. Payment of wages from withheld payments and listing contractors who violate contracts.

- (a) The state disbursing officer in the case of a state public construction contract and the local fiscal officer in the case of a political subdivision public construction contract shall pay directly to laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors from accrued payments withheld under the terms of the contract the wages due laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors under AS 36.05.070.
- (b) The state disbursing officer or the local fiscal officer shall distribute to all departments of the state government and to all political subdivisions of the state a list giving the names of persons who have disregarded their obligations to employees. A person appearing on this list and a firm, corporation, partnership, or association in which the person has an interest may not work as a contractor or

subcontractor on a public construction contract for the state or a political subdivision of the state until three years after the date of publication of the list. If the accrued payments withheld under the contract are insufficient to reimburse all the laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors with respect to whom there has been a failure to pay the wages required under AS 36.05.070, the laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors have the right of action or intervention or both against the contractor and the contractor's sureties conferred by law upon persons furnishing labor or materials, and in the proceedings it is not a defense that the laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors accepted or agreed to accept less than the required rate of wages or voluntarily made refunds.

Sec. 36.05.900. Definition.

In this chapter, "contracting agency" means the state or a political subdivision of the state that has entered into a public construction contract with a contractor.

EXCERPTS FROM ALASKA ADMINISTRATIVE CODE

Notice: Regulations relating to board and lodging and per diem went into effect on November 25, 2018. The new regulations are excerpted here

<u>8 AAC 30.051. Purpose.</u> The purpose of 8 AAC 30.052 - 8 AAC 30.056 is to ensure that wages paid to laborers, mechanics, and field surveyors do not fall below the prevailing rate of pay.

8 AAC 30.052. Board and lodging; remote sites. (a) A contractor on a public construction project located 65 or more road miles from the international airport closest to the project area in either Fairbanks, Juneau, or Anchorage, or that is inaccessible by road in a two-wheel drive vehicle, shall provide adequate board and lodging to each laborer, mechanic, or field surveyor while the person is employed on the project. If commercial lodging facilities are not available, the contractor shall provide temporary lodging facilities. Lodging facilities must comply with all applicable state and federal laws. For a highway project, the location of the project is measured from the midpoint of the project.

- (b) A contractor is not required to provide board and lodging:
 - (1) to a laborer, mechanic, or field surveyor who is a domiciled resident of the project area; or
 - (2) on a laborer, mechanic, or field surveyor's scheduled days off, when the person can reasonably travel between the project and the person's permanent residence; for the purposes of this paragraph, "scheduled day off" means a day in which a person does not perform work on-site, is not required to remain at or near the job location for the benefit of the contractor, and is informed of the day off at least seven days before the day off.
- (c) Upon a contractor's written request, the commissioner may waive the requirements of (a) of this section where:
 - (1) the project is inaccessible by road in a two-wheel drive vehicle, but the laborer, mechanic, or field surveyor can reasonably travel between the project and the person's permanent residence within one hour; or
 - (2) a laborer, mechanic, or field surveyor is not a domiciled resident of the project area, but has established permanent residence, with the intent to remain indefinitely, within 65 road miles of the project, or for a highway project, the mid-point of the project.
- **8** AAC 30.054. Per diem instead of board and lodging. (a) A contractor may pay a laborer, mechanic, or field surveyor per diem instead of providing board and lodging, when the following conditions are met:
 - (1) the department determines that per diem instead of board and lodging is an established practice for the work classification; the department shall publish and periodically revise its determinations in the pamphlet Laborers and Mechanics Minimum Rates of Pay;
 - (2) the contractor pays each laborer, mechanic, or field surveyor the appropriate per diem rate as published and periodically revised in the pamphlet *Laborers and Mechanics Minimum Rates of Pay*; and

- (3) the contractor pays the per diem to each laborer, mechanic, or field surveyor on the same day that wages are paid.
- (b) A contractor may not pay per diem instead of board and lodging on a highway project located
 - (1) west of Livengood on the Elliot Highway, AK-2;
 - (2) on the Dalton Highway, AK-11;
 - (3) north of milepost 20 on the Taylor Highway, AK-5;
 - (4) east of Chicken on the Top of the World Highway; or
 - (5) south of Tetlin Junction to the Alaska-Canada border on the Alaska Highway, AK-2.

8 AAC 30.056. Alternative arrangement. Upon a contractor's written request, the commissioner may approve an alternative board and lodging or per diem arrangement, provided

- (1) the arrangement does not reduce the laborer, mechanic, or field surveyor's wages below the prevailing wage rate; and
- (2) the laborer, mechanic, or field surveyor voluntarily enters into and signs the written arrangement; a labor organization representing laborers, mechanics, or field surveyors may enter into the written agreement on their behalf.

8 AAC 30.900. General definitions (selected excerpts only):

In this chapter and in AS 36

- (22) "domiciled resident" means a person living within 65 road miles of a public construction project, or in the case of a highway project, the mid-point of the project, for at least 12 consecutive months prior to the award of the public construction project;
- (23) "employed on the project" means the time period from the date the laborer, mechanic, or field surveyor first reports on-site to the project through the final date the person reports on-site to the project.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

PER DIEM


Notice: New regulations relating to board and lodging and per diem went into effect on November 25, 2018. The regulations provide a comprehensive set of requirements for the provision of board and lodging or per diem for workers on remote projects. Please refer to Alaska Administrative Code 8 AAC Chapter 30 and read the chapter carefully.

The Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development has determined that per diem is an established work practice for certain work classifications. These classifications are indicated throughout the Pamphlet by an asterisk (*) under the classification title. If all of the conditions of 8 AAC 30.054 are met, an employer may pay workers in these classifications per diem instead of providing board and lodging on a remote project.

Per Diem Rate: As of May 1, 2019, the minimum per diem rate is \$100.00 per day, or part thereof, the worker is employed on the project. In the event that a contractor provides lodging facilities, but no meals, the department will accept a payment of \$48 per day for meals to meet the per diem requirements.

LABORER CLASSIFICATION CLARIFICATION

The laborer rates categorized in class code S1201-S1206 apply in one area of Alaska; the area that is south of N63 latitude and west of W138 Longitude. The laborer rates categorized in class code N1201-N1206 apply in two areas of Alaska; the Alaska areas north of N63 latitude and east of W138 longitude. The following graphic representations should assist with clarifying the applicable wage rate categories:



APPRENTICE RATES

Apprentice rates at less than the minimum prevailing rates may be paid to apprentices according to an apprentice program which has been registered and approved by the Commissioner of the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development in writing or according to a bona fide apprenticeship program registered with the U.S. Department of Labor, Office of Apprenticeship Training. Any employee listed on a payroll at an apprentice wage rate who is not registered as above shall be paid the journeyman prevailing minimum wage in that work classification. Wage rates are based on prevailing crew makeup practices in Alaska and apply to work performed regardless of either the quality of the work performed by the employee or the titles or classifications which may be assigned to individual employees.

FRINGE BENEFIT PLANS

Contractors/subcontractors may compensate fringe benefits to their employees in any one of three methods. The fringe benefits may be paid into a union trust fund, into an approved benefit plan, or paid directly on the paycheck as gross wages.

Where fringe benefits are paid into approved plans, funds, or programs including union trust funds, the payments must be contributed at least monthly. If contractors submit their own payroll forms and are paying fringe benefits into approved plans, funds, or programs, the employer's certification must include, in addition to those requirements of <u>8 AAC 30.020(c)</u>, a statement that fringe benefit payments have been or will be paid at least monthly. Contractors who pay fringe benefits to a plan must ensure the plan is one approved by the Internal Revenue Service and that the plan meets the requirements of <u>8 AAC 30.025</u> (eff. 3/2/08) in order for payments to be credited toward the prevailing wage obligation.

SPECIAL PREVAILING WAGE RATE DETERMINATION

Special prevailing wage rate determinations may be requested for special projects or a special worker classification if the work to be performed does not conform to traditional public construction for which a prevailing wage rate has been established under <u>8 AAC 30.050(a)</u> of this section. Requests for special wage rate determinations must be in writing and filed with the Commissioner <u>at least 30 days before the award of the contract</u>. An applicant for a special wage rate determination shall have the responsibility to support the necessity for the special rate. An application for a special wage rate determination filed under this section must contain:

- (1) a specification of the contract or project on which the special rates will apply and a description of the work to be performed;
- (2) a brief narrative explaining why special wage rates are necessary;
- (3) the job class or classes involved;
- (4) the special wage rates the applicant is requesting, including survey or other relevant wage data to support the requested rates;
- (5) the approximate number of employees who would be affected; and
- (6) any other information which might be helpful in determining if special wage rates are appropriate.






VICINITY MAP



MODIFICATIONS TO CITY OF VALDEZ STANDARD SPECIFICATIONS

The following listed provisions of the C.V.S.S. are amended as hereinafter stated:

ADD

SECTION 60.19 EXISTING STRUCTURE CLEANING AND INSPECTION

Article 19.1 Valve Cleaning and Inspection

Existing valves are to be cleared of any debris. Contractor to perform test valve actuation and record any observations. Contractor shall provide inspection footage of the valve and observations to the engineer for review and acceptance. Engineer will review footage and provide recommendation regarding additional required maintenance or valve replacement.

Article 19.2 Submittals

Submittals are to be provided to the Engineer for review and acceptance as stated in Division 10, Section 10.05, Article 5.6 – Product Data. Submittals, at a minimum, are to include applicable items identified below:

- Contractor shall submit well-lit before and after photos of each valve box cleaned.
- Annotated plan set showing location of each valve box serviced with corresponding identification number that aligns with photos.
- Notes of any deficiencies observed, i.e. missing lid or dust pan, misaligned riser casing and valve box, valves that are frozen and cannot be actuated, etc. Deficiencies shall be captured in photos to the extent feasible.

Article 19.3 Payment

Payment for this work is to be as specified in Division 10, Article 10.07 – Measurement and Payment, and include full payment for all work described in this section. Payment includes all labor, tools, equipment, apparatus and incidentals required to complete the work. At a minimum, no additional payment will be granted for setups, reverse setups, tear downs, relocation, overlapping footage per bid item, lost or damaged equipment, property owner coordination, and additional cleaning during inspection.



This purchase is a budgeted item for 2025 and will replace the Port Division's current 2011 Bobcat S100 in accordance with the Major Equipment Schedule. The expected lifespan of the new loader is 10 years.

The purchase price of the Volvo L30H Loader and the accessories reflects a 42.1% discount off the list price of \$184,913.00, as it is being procured through the Sourcewell Cooperative Government Agreement.

WHEREAS, Chapter 3.30 was established through the adoption of Ordinance No. 24-16 on December 3, 2024;

WHEREAS, the City desires to amend Chapter 3.30 as provided herein to provide for additional flexibility regarding the timeline for notice of assessment and collection of taxes owing under VMC 3.30.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF VALDEZ, ALASKA THAT, the following:

<u>Section 1.</u> The City of Valdez hereby amends Chapter 3.30 entitled Oil and Gas Exploration, Production, and Pipeline Transportation, and Spill Prevention and Response Property Tax as follows:

3.30.080. Assessment Notice. Assessment notices shall be provided in the manner set forth in Section 3.12.100. On or before March 1 of each year, the city shall send to every owner of taxable property named in the assessment roll a notice of assessment, showing the assessed value of the property. Notice of assessment is effective on the date of mailing.

3.30.130. Collection and deposit. By July 1st, the city shall mail tax statements setting out the levy, dates when taxes are payable and delinquent, and penalties and interest. The tax levied under this chapter is payable to the city on or before June 30 of the taxable year.

<u>Section 2.</u> All other provisions of Chapter 3.30 shall remain unchanged.

<u>Section 3.</u> This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon final approval and adoption by the Valdez City Council.

- Volunteer Fire Capacity is an award of Federal Financial Assistance with funding from the USDA Forest Service. Prime and sub-recipients to this award are subject to OMB guidance in sub-parts A through F of 2 CFR Part 200 as adapted and supplemented by the USDA in 2 CFR Part 400. Adoption by USDA of the OMB guidance in 2 CFR 400 gives regulatory effect to OMB guidance in 2 CFR 200 where full text may be found.

The adopted City of Valdez Comprehensive Waterfront Master Plan outlines strategic priorities for the development and improvement of our waterfront infrastructure to meet the current and future needs of our community. The proposed projects are critical to supporting economic growth, facilitating commerce, and enhancing recreational opportunities, as well as meeting transportation and trade demands.

To advance these projects, the permitting and design phase must first be completed to ensure compliance with regulatory standards and to establish detailed plans for construction. Federal funding opportunities may be available to assist with this initial phase, providing a means to secure necessary resources without creating a significant financial burden on local taxpayers. The City is seeking to pursue up to \$4,000,000 in federal funding to support this effort.











Cost Per Animal Minus Employee Expenses







Daily Cost Per Animal






Largest Expenditures in Operations Line Item of Budget








Cost per animal minus medical expenses



Report: Implementation of 'Valdez Fix It' Resident Reporting Initiative

The City of Valdez will launch "Valdez Fix It," a new resident reporting initiative powered by SeeClickFix. The tagline is "Your Voice, Our Action—Report, Resolve, Improve with Valdez Fix It."

"Valdez Fix It" enables residents to report non-emergency issues 24/7, fostering a more responsive and collaborative community. Individuals can submit issues such as potholes, trash collection, graffiti, missing or damaged street signs, abandoned vehicles, and other concerns.

Reports can be submitted via a link embedded on the City's website or a dedicated mobile app, ensuring accessibility and convenience.

The rollout of "Valdez Fix It" will occur in three phases:

- Phase 1 (March): Focus on public works issues, such as Garbage and Garbage Containers, Potholes, Street Signs, Street Lights, and Street Drainage. Other categories include Graffiti, Overdose Emergency Kits, broken/Damaged Fire Hydrants, and Other related concerns.
- Phase 2 (May): Categories implemented in May will be Tree and Brush Maintenance, Road Hazards, Unsanctioned Camping, and possibly Nuisance Abatement and Code Enforcement (e.g., Abandoned Vehicles, Private Property Issues).
- Phase 3 (June): Categories will include Parks, Playgrounds, and Trails.

Implementing SeeClickFix through "Valdez Fix It" offers several benefits:

- Efficient Request Resolutions: The platform provides online request services for residents and streamlined workflows for staff, enhancing efficiency in addressing community issues.
- Real-Time Communication: Residents receive immediate feedback and can track the status of their requests, promoting transparency and trust between the community and the City.
- **Customizable Experience:** The system allows tailored interactions, ensuring resident concerns are addressed effectively and personally.
- **Data-driven insights:** The platform's analytics can inform future planning and improve service delivery by identifying trends and areas needing attention.

Contractors are selected from a roster developed through Request for Qualifications (RFQ) posted June, 2024. The Grant Report specifies a 200% increase in grant activity in the last five years (28) new). In order to maintain the trajectory a systematic approach to Grant Program Administration is necessary.

A contract and Budget Resolution will be presented for approval on March 4th for Grant **Program Administration Gap Analysis.**

Finance will request additional funds in the 2026 Budget for implementation based on gap analysis findings.

City of Valdez Grant Report

Executive Summary: Open/pending grants, sources of revenue, and programs result in 43 separate funding opportunities. Of which, 28 are *new* within the last 5 years. The City of Valdez needs to conduct a "Grant Program Administration Gap Analysis", to understand where risks are that may put future funding in jeopardy as well as establish best practices with respect to its grant program.

City staff are currently leveraging contractors for Grant Research and will continue to pursue software solutions and consultant relationships prior to requesting a Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) for Grant Program Administration.

Not all funding opportunities are created equal and generally follow the Pareto principle where 80% of staff time is spent on 20% of funding opportunities and vice versa. Below is a timeline related to internal organizing as the City's Grant Program has developed.

These tasks address the ongoing childcare challenges in Valdez and support long-term solutions for families and businesses in our community.

Valdez Child Care Initiative: Project Status Update

Overview

The Valdez childcare initiative is progressing toward creating a sustainable and scalable childcare model aligned with the community's needs and long-term strategic goals. This initiative focuses on enhancing childcare capacity, supporting economic development, and addressing the challenges identified in the Valdez Child Care Task Force recommendations, Valdez by the Numbers, and the Valdez long-term strategic plan.

Key Milestones Achieved

1. Stakeholder Engagement

- Met with Valdez City Council members, Economic Diversification Commissioners, and Child Care Crisis Task Force alumni to share updates and gather feedback.
- Attended meetings with Prince William Sound College and Alyeska Pipeline Service Company representatives to explore collaborative opportunities.
- Presented evidence-based solutions and funding models and answered subject matter questions at several EDC meetings.

2. Start-Up Grant Program Design

 Established a framework to manage the start-up grant program, including an advertised request for Letters of Interest (LOIs), interviews with prospective providers, and a transparent project recommendation process for funding allocation.

3. Operating Grant Program Development

- A cost model has been proposed, recommending an operating grant of \$400 per child per month to support ongoing operations of childcare providers.
- Collaboration with stakeholders, including the Economic Diversification Commission, has refined the approach to funding distribution.

4. Alignment with Strategic Goals

o Integrated initiatives with the Valdez long-term strategic planning document to ensure continuity and alignment with economic diversification objectives.



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1. INVESTMENT MEASUREMENT SERVICES REPORTS

Callan shall review and evaluate the performance of the total fund, asset classes, and investment managers for the Fund and shall provide written quarterly reports to the City. Callan will calculate the performance of each of the managers/funds, using data provided by Principal, the custodian of the Fund. Callan will also provide analytics on each of these managers.

Callan shall attend an annual meeting in Valdez, in the absence of significant extenuating circumstances, and quarterly meetings via conference call. At the annual meeting and quarterly meetings, Callan shall make oral presentations regarding the investment managers' performance.

2. INVESTMENT MANAGER MONITORING

Callan shall provide on-going monitoring and evaluation of investment managers for the Fund.

3. INVESTMENT POLICY STATEMENT

Callan shall prepare statement of policy, guidelines and objectives for the Fund. This document shall detail priorities, investment alternatives and acceptable asset classes while providing specifications for investment quality, liquidity and risk, along with time horizons and minimum performance objectives. In addition, Callan shall conduct an annual review of this document and recommend appropriate changes.

4. ASSET ALLOCATION UPDATES

Based upon agreed objectives and investment policy statement, Callan shall annually review the asset mix for the Fund and make recommendations on an appropriate range of asset mixes for the Fund. Factors that shall be considered are cash flow forecasts, estimates of asset class investment returns and inflation.

5. INVESTMENT MANAGER SEARCH

Upon expression by the City of the desire to initiate a search and selection process for an investment manager, Callan shall develop and recommend suitable criteria to be used in selection of an investment manager. Callan shall conduct the search and present at least two (2) finalists to the City. The City shall make the final manager selection decision.

6. CALLAN INSTITUTE

During the term of this Agreement, the City will be a member of the Callan Institute ("CI" or "Institute"). CI is a continuing education and research facility in the pensions and investments industry. A division of Callan, the Institute was established in 1980 and

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its membership has steadily grown to over 400 leading corporate, public, endowment/foundation and multi-employer fund clients and investment management organizations. The Institute provides research and educational assistance through periodic surveys, monthly and quarterly market index summaries, and research papers. In addition, trustees and staff designated by trustees may attend regional and national Institute conferences without payment of a registration fee.

7. ADDITIONAL CONSULTING SERVICES

Additional consulting services not outlined in this Scope of Work are available to the City from Callan. Such services are not included in the base fee described in Appendix B. The scope and fee for additional consulting services shall be made in writing in the form of an amendment mutually agreed upon and duly executed by both the City and Consultant. The Consultant's Project Manager shall be the point of contact with regard to any contractual matters.

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Appendix B Basis of Compensation

Callan's fee for performance of the work referenced in "Scope of Work" in Appendix A shall be \$99,500. All fees are quoted on a cash basis. The City will be invoiced at the end of each calendar quarter, beginning with the end of the first quarter of the effective date of this Agreement. The City shall make cash payments within thirty (30) days following receipt of billing from Callan. Interest of 1 % per month will be charged on all overdue balances.

Appendix C General Conditions

I. <u>Definitions:</u>

Basic Services: The identified work elements set forth in this Agreement for which the Consultant will receive prime compensation.

<u>Change:</u> An addition to, or reduction of, or other revision in the scope, complexity, character, or duration of the services or other provisions of this Agreement.

<u>City's Project Manager:</u> City's representative in charge of the project(s) and the consultant's primary point of contact for notice(s) to proceed, invoices, correspondence and interface with the City.

Consultant's Project Manager: The Consultant's representative in charge of the project(s) who is directly responsible and engaged in performing the required services.

<u>Extra Services:</u> Any services or actions required of the Consultant above and beyond provisions of this Agreement.

<u>Funding Agency(s)</u>: The agency(s) of the federal, state or municipal government which furnishes funds for the Consultant's compensation under this Agreement.

Optional Services: Identifiable and/or indeterminate work elements set forth in this Agreement, which are separate and distinct from those covered by the prime compensation, which the City has the option to authorize.

<u>Prime Compensation:</u> The dollar amount paid to the Consultant for basic services set forth in this Agreement. Prime compensation does not include payment for any optional or extra services.

Scope of Work: Basic and optional services required of the Consultant by provisions of this Agreement.

<u>Subconsultant:</u> Any person, firm, corporation, joint venture, partnership or other entity engaged through or by Consultant.

II. <u>Information and Services from Others:</u>

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Provisions of information, data, budget, standards, and other materials by the City does not warrant their accuracy or quality nor provide approval of omissions or oversights or of any non-compliance with applicable regulation.

The City may, at its election, or in response to a request from the Consultant, furnish information or services from other consultants. If, in the Consultant's opinion, such information or services are inadequate, the Consultant must notify the City of the specific service or material deemed inadequate and the extent of the inadequacy prior to use in the performance of this Agreement. Unless so notified by the Consultant, the City may assume the information or services provided are adequate.

III. Indemnification

To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Consultant shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City from and against any claim of, or damages, losses, expenses and liability (including but not limited to fees and charges of engineers, architects, attorneys, and other professionals, and court, mediation and/or arbitration costs) for negligent acts, errors, and omissions of the Consultant, Subconsultant, persons or organizations directly or indirectly employed or engaged by Consultant or Subconsultant under this Agreement. The Consultant is not required to indemnify, defend, or hold harmless the City for a claim of, or liability for the independent negligent acts, errors, and omissions of the City. If there is a claim of, or liability for a joint negligent act, error, or omission of the Consultant and the City, the indemnification, defense, and hold harmless obligation of this provision shall be apportioned on a comparative fault basis. In this provision, "Consultant" and "City" include the employees, agents, and contractors who are directly responsible, respectively, to each. In this provision, "independent negligent acts, errors, and omissions" means negligence other than in the City's selection, administration, monitoring, or controlling of the Consultant, or in approving or accepting the Consultant's work.

IV. Insurance:

All of the insurance coverages listed in Article 5 shall be purchased by the Consultant. The City shall be made an additional insured on the Consultants Commercial General Liability policy in connection with the activities related to this contract. The Consultant shall purchase and maintain the Article 5 insurance coverages with limits not less than those specified for the duration of the Agreement. The professional liability insurance shall be maintained in force for one year following the date of final payment for the work performed herein. The amount of the contract may be renegotiated if the insurance premiums for the following year are raised over those in force when the contract was let. Should the professional liability insurance become unavailable during the one year period following the date of final payment, the insurance coverage may be renegotiated between the City and the Consultant. Insurance coverage shall provide for negligent acts, errors or omissions which the Consultant, employees of the Consultant or Subconsultant may make which produce loss or liability to the

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City and for the protection against loss which results from reliance on the Consultant's products, reports or a combination thereof. Failure to comply with the provision for maintaining the insurance in effect for one year following the date of final payment may be cause for the City to refrain from dealing with the Consultant in the future.

V. Payments:

The City shall pay to the Consultant the amount of any changes in the cost of insurance that are attributable to the Scope of Work created by change orders.

Payments shall be made in accordance with Appendix B. Consultant shall submit progress invoices to City in duplicate showing the itemized services performed during the invoice period and the charges therefore.

All progress invoices shall be prepared as a percentage of the work is completed except contracts performed on "time and expenses" basis which invoiced amounts shall not exceed the actual charges to the invoice date.

Under no circumstances will City pay for charges in excess of any lump-sum or not-to-exceed contract amount incurred prior to written authorization by City for an increase in the contract amount. Written request for an increase in the contract amount shall be given to City with sufficient notice to allow City to issue formal approval prior to the incurring of excess charges without delay to the work.

On "time and expenses" contract amounts, compensation for work included in the Scope of Work shall be for direct labor costs and the actual cost of reimbursable expenses. Direct labor costs shall be as shown on the current Standard Labor Rates for the Consultant, times a factor of _______, for services rendered by principals and employees of the firm. Reimbursable expenses mean the actual expenses incurred directly or indirectly in connection with the Project for: transportation and subsistence incidental thereto; obtaining bids or proposals from contractor(s); furnishing and maintaining field office facilities; toll telephone calls and telegrams; reproduction of reports, drawings, specifications, and similar project-related items and, if authorized in advance by City, overtime work requiring higher than regular rates. Reimbursable expenses shall also include the amount billed to Consultant by Subconsultant employed by Consultant for such Subconsultants' services and reimbursable expenses times a factor of 1.05.

The sum of payments shall not exceed the allowable compensation stated in this Agreement. In the event items on an invoice are disputed, payment on those items will be withheld until the dispute is resolved.

The Consultant shall submit a final invoice and required documentation for services authorized by each Notice to Proceed within Ninety (90) days after final acceptance by

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the City. The City will not be held liable for payment of invoices submitted after this time unless prior written approval has been given.

VI. <u>Changes:</u>

Changes in the Scope of Work or of services may only be made by written amendment signed by both City and Consultant.

If at any time the City through its authorized representatives, either orally or in writing, requests or issues instructions for extra services or otherwise directs actions which conflict with any provisions of this Agreement, the Consultant shall, within ten (10) days of receipt and prior to pursuing such instructions, notify the City in writing, and to the extent possible, describe the scope and estimated cost of any extra services. Unless so notified by the Consultant, the City may assume such instructions have not changed any provisions of this Agreement nor require additional compensation. No additional payments shall be made to the Consultant without such notice.

VII. Audits and Records:

The Consultant shall maintain records of all performances, communications, documents, and correspondence pertinent to this Agreement, and the City and its authorized representatives shall have the right to examine such records and accounting procedures and practices.

The materials described in the Article shall be made available at the business office of the Consultant, at all reasonable times, for inspection, audit or reproduction by City or any funding agency, for a minimum of three years from the date (a) of final payment under this Agreement, (b) final payment upon claims or disputes, and (c) for such longer period, if any, as may be required by applicable statute or other provisions of this Agreement.

VIII. <u>Inspections:</u>

The City, or any funding agency, has the right to inspect, in the manner and at reasonable times it considers appropriate during the period of this Agreement, all facilities, materials and activities of the Consultant related to the performance of this Agreement.

IX. Termination or Suspension:

This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon ten (10) day's written notice if the other party fails substantially to perform in accordance with its terms through no fault of the party initiating the termination (default termination). If the City terminates this Agreement, the City will pay the Consultant a sum equal to the percentage of work completed that can be substantiated by the Consultant and the City. If the City becomes aware of any fault

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or defect in the work of the Consultant or nonconformance with this Agreement, the City will give prompt written notice thereof to the Consultant. Should the Consultant's services remain in nonconformance with this Agreement, the percentage of total compensation attributable to the nonconforming work may be withheld.

The City at any time may terminate (convenience termination) or suspend this Agreement for its own needs or convenience. In the event of a convenience termination or suspension for more than three months, the Consultant will be compensated for authorized services and authorized expenditures performed to the date of receipt of written notice of termination plus reasonable termination expenses. NO fee or other compensation for the uncompleted portion of the services will be paid, except for already incurred indirect costs which the Consultant can establish and which would have been compensated for over the life of this Agreement, but because of the convenience termination would have to be absorbed by the Consultant without further compensation.

If state or federal funds support this Agreement, settlement in the event of default or convenience termination must be approved by the City and any appropriate state or federal agency.

X. Officials Not to Benefit:

No member of or delegate to Congress, United States Commissioner or other officials of federal, state or local government shall be admitted to any share or part of this Agreement or any benefit to arise therefrom. The Consultant warrants that it has not employed or retained any organization or person, other than a bona fide employee working for the Consultant, to solicit or secure this Agreement and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any consideration contingent upon or resulting from this Agreement.

XI. <u>Independent Consultant:</u>

Except in those instances specifically provided for herein, the Consultant and any of its agents and employees shall act in an independent capacity and not as agents of the City in the performance of the Agreement.

XII. Ownership of Work Products:

Work products produced under this Agreement, except items which have preexisting copyrights, are the property of the City. Payments to the Consultant for services hereunder includes full compensation for all work products, field notes, interim work, reports, and other materials produced by the Consultant and its Subconsultants pertaining to this Agreement. Any re-use the City might make of these work products shall be at the City's own risk and the Consultant shall not incur any liability for the City's re-use of the work products on any project for which they were not intended.

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Notwithstanding anything contained herein to the contrary, the City acknowledges that the Consultant shall retain all of its rights in its methodologies, methods of analysis, ideas, concepts, know-how, techniques, skills, knowledge and experience possessed by the Consultant before the commencement of the term of this Agreement or acquired by the Consultant during the provision of the services.

XIII. Subconsultants, Successors and Assigns:

The City must concur in the selection of all Subconsultants for professional services to be engaged in performance of this Agreement.

As soon as practicable after the award of the contract, the Consultant shall furnish to the City in writing the names of the proposed Subconsultants for each of the principal portions of the work. The City shall promptly notify the Consultant if it has reasonable objection to any of the proposed Subconsultants. Failure of the City to give prompt notification shall constitute notice of no reasonable objection. The Consultant shall not contract with any Subconsultant to whom the City has made reasonable objection.

If this Agreement includes named firms or individuals, then such firms or individuals shall be employed for the designated services, unless the Agreement is changed by amendment.

The Consultant shall not assign, sublet or transfer any interest in this Agreement without the prior written consent of the City.

The Consultant binds itself, its partners, its Subconsultants, assigns and legal representatives to this Agreement and to the successors, assigns and legal representatives of the City with respect to all covenants of this Agreement.

The Consultant shall include provisions appropriate to effectuate the purposes of this Appendix C in all subcontracts executed to perform services under this Agreement in which subcontract amount exceeds \$40,000.

XIV. <u>Claims and Disputes:</u>

If the Consultant becomes aware, or reasonably should have become aware of any act or occurrence which may form the basis of a claim under or related to this Agreement, the Consultant shall immediately inform the City's Project Manager. If the matter cannot be resolved within seven (7) days, the Consultant shall within the next fourteen (14) days submit written notice of the facts which may form the basis of the claim.

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In addition, all claims by the Consultant for additional compensation or an extension of the time for performance, in each case related to any dispute regarding a question of fact or interpretation of this Agreement, shall be presented in writing by the Consultant to the City's Project Manager within the next sixty (60) days unless the Project Manager agrees in writing (such agreement not to be unreasonably withheld) to an extension of time for good cause shown. Good cause shown includes time for the Consultant to prepare the claim, and the City's Project Manager will grant an extension of not more than sixty (60) days for preparation of the claim. The Consultant agrees that unless these written notices are provided, the Consultant shall not be entitled to additional time or compensation for such act, event or condition. The Consultant shall in any case continue diligent performance under this Agreement. The Consultant shall in any case continue to expeditiously accomplish disputed services pending future resolution of the Consultant's claim unless notified by the City to stop work on the disputed matter.

In presenting any claim, the Consultant shall specifically include, to the extent then possible, the following:

- The provisions of this Agreement that apply to the claim and under which it is made.
- The specific relief requested including any additional compensation claimed and the basis upon which it was calculated and/or the additional time requested and the basis upon which it was calculated.
- The claim will be acknowledged in writing by the City's Project Manager. If the claim is not disposed of within sixty (60) days of acknowledgement, provided additional time is not granted in writing by the City's Contract Officer, the claim will be decided by the City's Contract Officer. The Contract Officer reserves the right to make a written request to the Consultant at any time for additional information that the Consultant may possess to support the claims(s). The Consultant agrees to provide the City such additional information within thirty (30) days of receipt for such a request. The City's Contract Officer will allow a reasonable time extension for good cause if presented in writing prior to the expiration of the thirty (30) days. Failure to furnish such additional information constitutes a waiver of claim.
- The Consultant will be furnished a written, signed copy of the Contract Officer's decision within ninety (90) days of receipt of all necessary information from the Contractor upon which to base the decision. The Contract Officer's decision is final and conclusive unless, within thirty (30) days of receipt of the decision, the Consultant delivers a notice of appeal to the City Manager. The notice of appeal shall include specific exceptions to

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the City's decision including specific provision of this Agreement which the Consultant intends to rely upon on appeal. General assertions that the City's decision is contrary to law or to fact are not sufficient.

- The decision of the City Manager will be rendered within 120 days of notice of appeal and the decision constitutes the exhaustion of contractual and administrative remedies.

XV. Extent of Agreement:

This Agreement, including appendices, represents the entire and integrated Agreement between the City and the Consultant and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations or agreements, either written or oral.

Nothing contained herein may be deemed to create any contractual relationship between the City and any Subconsultants or material suppliers; nor may anything contained herein be deemed to give any third party a claim or right of action against the City or the Consultant that does not otherwise exist without regard to this Agreement.

This Agreement may be changed only by written amendment executed by both the City and the Consultant.

All communications that affect this Agreement must be made or confirmed in writing.

The Consultant receiving final payment will execute a release, if reasonably required, relinquishing in full all claims against the City arising out of or by reason of the services and work products furnished under this Agreement.

The Consultant shall pay all federal, state and local taxes incurred by the Consultant and shall require payment of such taxes by any Subconsultant or any other persons in the performance of this Agreement.

XVI. <u>Governing Laws:</u>

This Agreement is governed by the laws of the State of Alaska and such federal and local laws and ordinances as are applicable to work performed. Any litigation arising out of the terms of this Agreement shall be brought in the Third Judicial District, Superior or District Court at Valdez.

XVII. <u>Minimum Wages:</u>

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Minimum wages as determined by the Department of Labor shall be paid to all persons performing work on this Contract.

ADDRESS DELAYS IN CARE

PRIOR AUTHORIZATION

Patients across Alaska experience delays for care as a result of prior authorization. Originally intended to confirm the appropriateness of care, this practice has led to denials and delays to healthcare, administrative burdens for healthcare professionals, and, most critically, interruptions in the care that patients urgently need.

NURSE LICENSURE COMPACT (NLC)

Alaska needs to update its professional licensing process to incorporate modern best practices. Currently, 43 states and jurisdictions have license reciprocity through the NLC so that qualified nurses can practice across state lines with a single license. It is widely supported by Alaska nurses—a 2023 survey shows 92% of respondents support Alaska joining the NLC.

HEALTHCARE INFRASTRUCTURE AND SERVICES

Alaska's healthcare system is stuck. We lack infrastructure and services, with one in seven hospital beds occupied by patients who are medically ready to leave but cannot be discharged because there is no place to go for continued care. In 2023, Alaskans spent 67% longer in the hospital than the national average.

Invest in healthcare capital projects and services, and realign reimbursement streams to increase throughput in our healthcare system.

PROMOTE FISCAL SUSTAINABILITY

CERTIFICATE OF NEED (CON)

CON laws are a healthcare planning and regulatory mechanism used to balance healthcare access and cost. It is a public, transparent process for vetting projects that could add significantly to a state's Medicaid budget. In states that have repealed CON - such as Georgia, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Indiana - per capita health expenditures for hospital and physician services grew at a higher rate in the years following repeal.

MEDICAID SERVICES

Medicaid is a federal-state partnership that provides health coverage and long-term care services for Alaska's most vulnerable: children, seniors, people with disabilities, pregnant women, and very low income or working poor. The program is vital to Alaska's healthcare infrastructure. Medicaid and Medicare often underpay for healthcare services, which creates a significant cost shift to private insurance and drives up healthcare costs to Alaskans.

Enact the NLC to get nurses to work faster, aid recruitment and retention. and support military families relocating to Alaska.

Reform the prior authorization

integrating technology.

process by broadening exemptions,

imposing strict time limits on reviews,

requiring disclosures by insurers, and

- Don't repeal CON make refinements to the administrative code. AHHA is committed to working with the Legislature and the Department of Health on such an approach.
- Fully-fund the Medicaid program to mitigate cost shifts and incentivize service delivery for our vulnerable populations.

Attached are the one page summary documents for the adopted City of Valdez State Legislative Priorities and Federal Advocacy Priorities

Support Local Housing and Child Care Needs

The Valdez City Council has identified housing and child care as their top two priorities. Valdez has been working hard on local initiatives and trying to find ways to support projects in both areas, but addressing these dual crises will require ongoing support from all levels of government.

- Maintain and expand funding for direct aid to communities in addressing housing scarcity and affordability issues.
- Help local providers navigate the licensing process.
- Establish a statewide organization to allow child care professionals access to health insurance, benefits and administrative support.
- Support flexibility in how individual communities approach child care and housing challenges.

Adequately Fund Public Education

Support for education accounts for 19% of the city's annual appropriations. We urge the Alaska Legislature and the Governor to fund K-12 education adequately and equitably in Alaska as the Alaska Constitution mandates.

- Increase the Base Student Allocation by passing HB 69, SB 46, or a similar bill.
- Provide robust funding for School Bond Debt Reimbursement and the School Major Maintenance Grant Program.

Increase Local Control in Municipal Property Taxation

Assessed values of homes have dramatically increased in Valdez, and state law significantly limits how local governments can respond to offer taxpayers some relief.

- Reexamine AS 29.45 governing property taxation by local governments in Alaska.
- Add flexibility in allowable local tax exemptions, especially for residential properties.

Staff and Sustain Valdez Area State Parks

The passive management of thousands of acres of State Park lands around Valdez since 2016 has caused a cost-shift to the City of Valdez and created public safety concerns.

- Valdez area state parks have been receiving record numbers of visitors in recent years.
- Add a full time park ranger position in Valdez.

Keep Our Community Connected with Reliable Transportation Systems

The Richardson Highway and Alaska Marine Highway are lifelines for our community and there are various other state-owned roads, bridges and facilities, including our local airport, in Valdez that require consistent upkeep and attention from the Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities.

- Ensure adequate staffing of maintenance positions in Thompson Pass and reduce closures.
- Improve regular ferry service to Valdez.
- Prioritize upkeep of state owned roads and infrastructure.

Stabilize the Public Retirement Systems

The quality of Alaska's Public Retirement System is important for recruiting and retaining public servants, especially our first responders and teachers. We believe the creation of a new defined benefits option within the state retirement system (both PERS and TRS) is desirable and is especially important for attracting high quality professionals to our community. The city urges the legislature to pass SB 27 or a similar measure.

Support Prince William Sound Fisheries

Valdez is home to 41 permit holders and homeport to 91 vessels participating in various commercial fisheries and one of the largest purse seine salmon fisheries in Alaska.

- 2024 marked a year of historically low returns for the commercial salmon fisheries in PWS, with many returns down over 80% compared to average. PWS fishermen need an economic disaster declaration and as much assistance as possible.
- Stable funding for the ADF&G Commercial Fisheries Division supports our fisheries' success with the data collection and core functions of this division.
- Funding for the Alaska Seafood Marketing Institute ensures that our fishemen and processors have access to strong markets.
- COV appreciates the ongoing state support of mariculture in PWS.

Maintain Quality State Services in Valdez

- Significant delays in prosecution of criminal charges by the state is a problem in Valdez that the Court System and Department of Law need to remedy.
- Local Spill Prevention and Response staff help ensure that oil is safely moved through Port Valdez and that resources are available in the event of a major oil spill event.
- The Valdez DMV office allows residents to conduct business without having to travel more than 100 miles.
- Maintaining a wildlife trooper position in Valdes is vital to an orderly fishery and maintains established boundaries for resource protection and marine traffic.
- Keeping the existing staff position for OCS in Valdez helps ensure families in vulnerable positions get needed support.

2024 FEDERAL VALUEZ ADVOCACY PRIORITIES VALUEZ

Support Local Housing Solutions

The City of Valdez has worked diligently to address housing scarcity at the local level through reexamining local land use polices and zoning requirements, offering incentives for construction of new dwelling units and establishing temporary property tax exemptions for development in key areas. Communities are doing what we can but federal assistance with addressing this issue is both welcome and greatly needed.

- Improve housing options for U.S. Coast Guard members stationed in Valdez.
- Identify federal funding opportunities through HUD or other agencies to promote additional highquality housing units in Valdez with an emphasis on replacement of the large number of aging mobile and manufactured homes in our community.

Work to Address the Child Care Crisis in Valdez

We are grateful to Senator Murkowski for helping to secure \$3 million for a new child care facility in Valdez as part of the FY24 Appropriations bill. The City of Valdez is taking a multipronged approach to addressing this issue by working on the interrelated areas of facility creation, workforce development and funding mechanisms to help businesses create licensed care in the community. We support federal funding opportunities that ensure there are adequate child care services.

- Explore options for a local Head Start grantee to manage and operate city-owned early education facility.
- Move forward with construction of facility once award letter for funding is received.

Maintain a Strong Coast Guard Presence in Port Valdez

A robust USCG presence is important to maintaining adequate emergency response capabilities and security for Valdez's strategically important port. Compared to other Alaska ports, Port Valdez has a strategic advantage for commerce and national defense, that the City of Valdez is committed to building upon.

- The city hopes to work with the Alaska Delegation to replace the Cutter "Liberty" as soon as possible. The Coast Guard has committed to a 87' foot cutter to be stationed in Valdez.
- Support adequate emergency response to handle TAPS and other sensitive material that enter the Port of Valdez.
- The stationing of future military assets in Port Valdez should be explored.

Valdez Should Play a Key Role in the Arctic of the Future

As the furthest north ice-free deep water port in the state, Valdez is in a prime position to become a strategic Arctic gateway. The City of Valdez supports federal efforts to promote sustainable development, environmental conservation, and infrastructure improvements to support increased Arctic activity.

- Highlight the importance of responsible development in the changing Arctic region.
- Address national security concerns as Russia continues to build out the Arctic.

Support Key Infrastructure Projects

The City of Valdez is hoping to leverage federal funding to improve and maintain Valdez's local infrastructure, including roads, bridges and our port to facilitate economic growth and enhance public safety. Our priority capital projects are:

- Emergency Radio Communications Tower Project
- Phase V Pavement Management on Pioneer Drive
- Sea Otter Park Development

Bolster Disaster Preparedness and Resilience

As a community that has experienced two major disasters in our history, Valdez takes emergency preparedness seriously and prioritizes ensuring that we are able to respond to emergency situations quickly and effectively.

- Prioritize federal assistance for disaster preparedness and response in Valdez, focusing on the city's vulnerability to natural disasters
- Find opportunities for federal funding to support resilience for the City of Valdez in future natural disasters.
- Seek federal funding to support the Valdez Avalanche Center, including National Weather Service daily weather observations.

Support Local Economic Diversification and Workforce Development

The City of Valdez is interested in pursuing federal initiatives that support economic diversification in Valdez, particularly in areas such as tourism, sustainable energy, and harbor expansion to facilitate economic growth and job creation. With the high price of a college degree, many in Congress have realized trade and vocational schools have been forgotten to a degree, and we have a serious lack of trained and skilled workers in this country.

- Collaborate with the U.S. Forest Service and Chugach Corporation to build a vocational education center in Valdez.
- Promote federal funding for educational and vocational training programs in Valdez, specifically tailored to the needs of the local workforce and industries, including maritime and environmental management.

The City of Valdez Supports:

SECURE RURAL SCHOOLS

Urge Congress to pass, and continue to fund, the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act.

HEALTHCARE ACCESS

Federal support can improve healthcare access in Valdez, including funding for healthcare facilities and addressing the healthcare workforce shortage.

SUSTAINABLE RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

We request Federal support for an emergency declaration for Prince
William Sound salmon fisheries devastated by record low 2024 returns. Additionally,
Reauthorization of the Magnus-Stevens Fisheries Management
Conservation Act is an opportunity to evaluate possible changes that could be beneficial to Prince William Sound.

TRIBAL SOVEREINTY AND SELF DETERMINATION EFFORTS

The Valdez Native Tribe is seeking federal recognition and the city supports this effort.

CLIMATE RESILIENCE EFFORTS

Prioritize funding for climate resilience projects in Valdez.
